Prime Minister praises high levels of

tenants

PRIME MINISTER Gordon Brown has praised North Glasgow Housing Association for its customer service.

He wrote to congratulate the Association on achieving the Government's new Customer Service Excellence Standard.

In his letter, Mr Brown says: "I am delighted to learn that your organisation has achieved the Customer Service Excellence standard.

"Please pass on my congratulations to everyone involved. To be recognised for this challenging standard is a tribute to your organisation's customer service culture.

"Your achievement demonstrates that you have recognised the importance of developing an in-depth understanding of your

customers' needs. Consultation and customer insight is vitally important if we are to continue to make the improvements we all want to see in public services."

It was another landmark attainment when North

Glasgow became the first housing association in Scotland to receive the new Customer Service Excellence Standard from emqc.

Emgc is one of the UK's leading organisational improvement and assessment companies working in partnership with Government and other agencies to help deliver accreditation services.





The Government Standard

Chief Executive Robert Tamburrini and Chair Pat Kenna travelled to Derby with other Committee Members and staff for the formal presentation of the certificate and a glass trophy to mark the achievement.

The new Customer Service Excellence Standard replaces Charter Mark, which is being phased out in 2011. The Association achieved that standard in 2004 but Charter Mark holders are not automatically moved to the new standard.

The Association had to measure up to new concepts of Customer Service Excellence and provide additional proof that it met the

Progress on homes transfer process

OUR TEAM is busy working on plans that could lead to the transfer of GHA homes in Springburn, Balornock, Parkhouse and Possilpark to North Glasgow Housing Association under a process known as Second Stage Transfer (SST).

A consultation process

started recently with the publication of our special newsletter, *Transfer News*. The Association is actively seeking the views of tenants in the three transfer areas and has established a free telephone number to call: 08000 46 38 12. Tenants are also being invited to use the

internet to make contact via email through the appropriately named

A survey to assess the physical condition of the houses has reached the half-way stage and North Glasgow HA has started to prepare business plans. This

will set out how we will manage and maintain the homes if the transfer goes ahead.

The business plan will include our proposals for rent guarantees and local offices and will also underline one of the cornerstones of North Glasgow Housing Association - local control.

When the plan is finalised, it will set out in clear terms all of our proposals so that local GHA tenants have all the information on what transferring ownership of their homes would mean for them.

It will cover the housing service, rents, repairs and investment in the houses, the protection of existing tenancy rights and a range of other



potential benefits.

Robert Tamburrini, Chief Executive of North Glasgow Housing Association, said: "We have started the process of consulting with our LHO Committees and GHA tenants so we can listen to their views and ideas and hear what their priorities are.

"We have been involved in a number of successful transfers in the past where we have given tenants promises and we have delivered on those promises.

"It is a reputation that we are proud of and plan to maintain in delivering enhanced local services for the GHA tenants in Springburn, Balornock, Parkhouse and Possilpark."

Ownership of the GHA houses in the three LHO areas can only transfer to North Glasgow Housing Association if a majority of the local tenants who vote in the ballot vote 'YES' to transfer.

The certificate and trophy were presented by Councillor Robert Troup, Derby City Cabinet Member for Housing and Environment, and Edwina Holmes, emqc's Client Support Manager.

John Thurgood, who carried out the assessment of the Association and also attended the ceremony, said: "North Glasgow Housing Association has exceptionally high levels of Tenant satisfaction with its services.

"Tenants spoke highly of the quality of homes provided and the proactive way North Glasgow Housing Association responded to their needs.

"The Management Committee members appointed to represent other Local Housing Organisations spoke of their desire for a speedy stock transfer to NGHA ownership in order that they might also have their preferred housing provider in place not least because NGHA met its promises to Tenants.

"The organisation is customer focused and members of staff frequently go beyond their statutory duty to provide solutions to Tenant problems working proactively to improve local communities in the Springburn and Possilpark areas.

"Extensive and effective partnerships are in place that make a difference to local communities and the Association is actively engaged in regenerating deprived areas of North Glasgow.

"North Glasgow Housing Association complies with the requirement of the current version of the Customer Service Excellence."

His recommendation to emqc's Certification

Committee that North Glasgow Housing Association be recognised as meeting the Customer Service Excellence Standard was unanimously accepted.

The certificate is valid for three years and is subject to an annual review.

Robert Tamburrini said: "We are committed to providing a top quality housing service and it's a great boost to be recognised in this way and receive praise from the Prime Minister."

The Association's partnerships and the involvement in the social, physical and economic life of the communities it serves were also praised.

SUNNYLAW Advice Centre provides information and assistance in dealing with welfare benefits, money advice, consumer problems, housing issues and employment advice.

It is based in Saracen Street, Possilpark, but also provides five outreach clinics in the Milton area of North Glasgow.

While the main office has an appointment system, the outreach clinics operate on a first come, first served basis.

Discretionary payments

A DISCRETIONARY Housing Payment may be made to top up Housing and or Council tax Benefit for up to six months.

The payment may be available to those experiencing financial difficulty who are not entitled to full benefit and making a contribution to rent/council tax.

The fund is administered by Glasgow City Council who have discretion on whether an application is successful, the

amount paid and the period the payment covers.

A separate form is required giving details of financial situation, income and expenditure and providing proof of other debts/household circumstances if required.

Help with your fuel bill

PENSION credit claimants are to receive a one-off £80 payment to help with fuel bills.

Help is to be targeted at households where a person, or one person in a couple, is aged 70 or over and in receipt of the guarantee element of pension credit on 26 March 2010.

Energy companies will automatically subtract the payment from the householders' bill.

Those pensioners covered by the scheme do not have to do anything but will be contacted by the DWP if the scheme applies to them.

An enquiry line has been set up on 0845 600 0033.

North Glasgow Housing Association and North Glasgow LHO have been working with partners to tackle anti-social behaviour within the Huntershill and Balgrayhill communities.

The types of Anti Social Behaviour we are targeting include:

- drug misuse/dealing
- street drinking/disorder
- vandalism
- graffiti
- littering
- disposal of rubbish
- dog fouling.

We have been working closely with our partners Strathclyde Police, Glasgow Community Safety Services, Glasgow City Council and Glasgow Housing Association Neighbour Relations Team to tackle incidents of Anti Social Behaviour within the community.

Legal proceedings will be taken against any tenant if they or any of their household members are identified as being involved in Anti Social Behaviour in the area.

Broomfield update...

THE NEW housing development at Broomfield Road is really taking shape.

The first phase of the £27.8M project has 30 family homes for strategic re-provisioning, 22 linked to Glasgow's community and social care priorities and 20 for share equity with first time buyers.

Shared equity is designed to help first time buyers. Purchasers need to pay a minimum of 60%, usually made up of savings and a mortgage. The Scottish Government provides up to 40% of the purchase price.

Owners have full title to the property and can increase their stake to outright ownership over

Alternatively, the stake is returned when the purchaser decides to sell and includes a share of any profit or loss generated.

Factoring charges held for a second year...

NORTH Glasgow Management Services, which provides factoring services for a large number of local residents who bought their homes, has been able to hold charges for buildings insurance and standard management fees for a second consecutive year.

This has been achieved without any reduction in cover or service and remains outstanding value in comparison to fees charged by private factors or agents.

Back Court Cleansing

A NUMBER of proprietors have recently asked for some clarity regarding the quarterly Back Court Cleansing and Bulk Uplift Charge.

These costs date back to a decision by Glasgow City Council's

Environmental Protection Services 2002/03.

The Council decided that the Back Court De-Littering and Bulk Refuse Removal Service would no longer be delivered free of charge.

Any Housing Association requiring the service beyond 30 August 2002 had to enter into a service level agreement and pay service charges on a quarterly basis.

North Glasgow HA pays the service charge quarterly and then seeks reimbursement of charges paid on behalf of all proprietors at zero interest.

The service is defined as a Sweeping, De-Littering and Disposal Service and includes the removal of bulk items. It is completely separate from and different to the "by appointment" bulk uplift service, which the Council offers to all households.

This maintenance service is necessary for the upkeep of common backcourts and all proprietors have a formal obligation recorded in their Deed of Conditions to meet their share of the service costs.

- 2 Is your home in danger of being repossessed?
- 3 Do all of the owners of the property agree to being considered for Mortgage to Rent?
- 4 Is the property the sole or main residence of someone in the household?
- 5 Is there a reason that your household has to remain in the local area?
- 6 Are you unable to sell your home and buy somewhere cheaper locally?
- 7 Is the property clear of any legal actions that would prevent it being sold?

GLASGOW North East MP Willie Bain has had a bird's eye view of the transformation of homes in Hawthorn Street, Blackthorn Street and Hickory Street.

He lives opposite the Elmvale Phase Two development in the Carron housing scheme in Springburn.

So he was a fitting choice to officially open the development that includes the 950th new home built by North Glasgow Housing Association.

Mr Bain told guests at the ceremony held in a specially erected marquee in Memel Street, Springburn, that he had watched the site change almost brick by brick.

Mr Bain said: "We've had over £100million of investment in the last decade or so but I know

from my postbag, from emails, from the people I meet, that housing is still a huge issue for this constituency. We need to see new properties being built to meet the growing number of families who want to live here.

"Housing isn't just about the physical environment. It's about the sense of community that it brings and I think the people in phase one have been absolutely overcome with how good this community is."

He paid tribute to North Glasgow Housing Association for the provision of housing and also the wider work it does in the community.

Robert Tamburrini, the Association's Chief Executive, said: "This has been a remarkable transformation from an unattractive and unpopular location to a very desirable one.

"The new development features a range of family homes and some designed specifically for people with particular needs.

"All the homes are built to 'Housing for Varying Needs' and 'Secure by Design' standards and have attained a 3 star EcoHomes rating from the Building Research Establishment."

The residents who have moved into the Phase Two properties have all been rehoused because their previous homes were due to be demolished through Glasgow Housing Association's demolition programme.

Mr Tamburrini added: "The residents have come from Red Road, Sighthill and Hamiltonhill to this new community and we welcome them all. We sincerely hope that they are as proud

and delighted with their homes as we are.

"The Management Committee and our staff remain focused on the future and the challenges that lie ahead. We are certain that with the continued support of our partners we can create a New North Glasgow, a great place to live, learn, visit, work and invest in."

After declaring the development formally open, Mr Bain visited some of the properties.

Among the tenants he met were John and Carol Ann Harrison, who recently moved from Hamiltonhill to Springburn with their son Ryan, 8, and 20-month-old twins Ross and Rebeca.

Mr Bain said: "This is a beautiful home and a fantastic environment in which to bring up a young family."

THE 5th Annual North Glasgow 5k Fun Run will be held at Ruchill Park on Sunday 25th April.

The ng5k, as it's now known, boasts the best party atmosphere in Glasgow.

This year around 2,900 fun runners are expected to sign up. It is one of the only events of its kind where participants of all ages and levels of ability take part together.

"Work projects have included environmental, social, creative and personal development tasks.

"The close was our first attempt and we have further plans including making tea and scones for residents of a local sheltered housing complex and arts and crafts. "We also hope to take Dreamscheme into local primary schools."

The scheme has been developed internationally and has won several awards.

It also received support from the Former Home Secretary, David Blunkett.

Mr Blunkett said: "The scheme offers a positive way forward which is not only using the energy of young people in a way that is beneficial to them, but also creates a new sense of purpose for the community who

start to believe that improvements can be brought about, behaviour changed and problems overcome."

The project at Saracen Street was supported by North Glasgow Housing Association.

■ YPF run 11 drop-in sessions every week in different locations in North Glasgow and have groupwork sessions with local young people covering issues like health & wellbeing, sexual health and drugs & alcohol awareness.

Four times each week, teams of dedicated streetworkers go out to

engage, support, advise, encourage and direct young people to relevant services.

They also have lots of special events through the year.

She now lives with partner Barry McGuire and their two-year-old son Lewis in Carron Street, part of the Fernbank 'Eco-Homes' development.

After assessment, properties there received the Building Research Establishment's (BRE) Eco-Homes rating of Very Good.

Pamela said: "We lived for over three years in a private let in a sandstone tenement. It was smaller than the house we now have and cost a small fortune for heating.

"We paid around £45 per week

but our bills here are less than a third of that."

Pamela and her family love other aspects of their home too.

She said: "It is a lovely home with lots of natural light and it has great security."

Ann Marie Devlin Senior Depute CEO of North Glasgow Housing Association, said: "When we opened the Fernbank development we were confident that tenants would see savings in their fuel running costs.

"Energy efficiency was given a priority when developing these new homes and we were delighted to gain a Very Good EcoHomes rating.

"It is good to know our forecasts were accurate and that tenants are benefitting from reduced fuel running costs."
