Launch of £27m housing project

COUNCILLOR Steven Purcell, the Leader of Glasgow City Council, has launched a multimillion pound regeneration project that will breathe new life into Red Road.

The £27million Broomfield Road development will transform a 16-acre site through the construction of 198 homes in a new mixed tenure development. The project is a unique partnership between Alexander Morton Homes, North Glasgow Housing Association and City Building (Glasgow) LLP.

The site forms part of the Red Road Transformational Regeneration area and will be developed in two phases.

A total of 122 homes, including 52 for rent, 50 for private sale and 20 for low cost home ownership are being built as part of the first phase of the project.

They will be a mix of 2 and 3 bedroom detached, terraced, semi-detached homes and barrier free wheelchair accessible homes.

As lead developer Alexander Morton Homes is responsible for all site infrastructures. Lead contractor City Building is building the house structures using timber kits manufactured at its Royal Strathclyde Blindcraft Industries (RSBi) workshop less than one mile away.

North Glasgow Housing Association will allocate the 52 homes for rent and 20 for low cost home ownership. The 20 homes available to buy on a shared equity basis will be sold through the Scottish Government's LIFT scheme, which offers eligible buyers up to a 40% grant. With a 40% grant it is likely that 2 bedroom homes will start at £66,000, and 3 bedrooms at £76,000.

Councillor Purcell, who was joined at the launch by a group of City Building apprentices, said: "This project will make a huge difference to the lives of people in the area, not just through improvements to the physical infrastructure, but also through the social legacy that the associated jobs and apprenticeship opportunities will bring.

"The mistake Glasgow made in the past during difficult economic times was in failing to invest for the future. Projects like this will help us ensure we don't make that mistake again.

"It's a perfect example of how partnerships between the public and private sectors can lead to

Building starts on 22 new homes...

NORTH Glasgow Housing Association is building another 22 affordable homes in Springburn.

The £3.9million Elmvale Phase Two development will include a mix of 2, 3 and 5 bedroom terraced homes. Construction work is underway and is expected to be complete by spring next year.

The homes are being built by construction firm CCG on a vacant site adjoining the recently completed £5.7million Elmvale Phase One development at Hawthorn Street. A mix of 41 family homes and properties for people with particular needs were built as part of the earlier phase of the project.

Chief Executive of North Glasgow Housing Association, Robert Tamburrini, said: "In recent years we have helped transform housing in communities across the north of the city through our new build programme, making a real and meaningful difference to people's lives while we do so.

"It is essential that we continue to drive regeneration in North Glasgow at these difficult financial times to ensure that we play our part in helping sustain employment in the city."

Councillor Elaine McDougall, Glasgow City Council's Executive Member for Housing, said: "Another twenty-two affordable new homes for Springburn is fantastic news.

"I'm particularly pleased to see that in both phase one and phase two of the Elmvale development, the needs of larger families and those with special requirements are being catered for.

"This area of Glasgow is really reaping the benefits of having a strong local housing association to lead in redeveloping and regenerating their community."

Partnership and Innovation Manager at CCG, Darren McCann, said: "In conjunction with North Glasgow Housing Association and the designers, we have been looking closely at the design, materials and operational issues to provide a sustainable solution for this challenging site."

A total of 42 skilled workmen from City Building and 20 apprentices will be employed during the project. Around £13million of the overall investment will also be spent in Glasgow through City Building's supply chain.

City Building is one of the UK's largest construction companies and operates the UK's largest apprenticeship schemes.

Apprentice joiner Leanne Mooney from Lambhill says it is great news that local people will have the chance to work on a project that is bringing real improvements to their community.

Leanne said: "The apprenticeship scheme is giving local people a chance to learn their

trade while gaining practical work experience on the job. The training we get is first class and it is great to be able to deliver real improvements for tenants while working for a local employer."

Bill helps fight heart disease

WHEN Bill Rossine suffered a heart attack three years ago it changed his life in more ways than one.

Since then the 85-year-old has started going to the gym, taking part in fun runs and even turned his hand to hill walking and some gentle climbing. He does so in full consultation with medical practitioners and he is in no doubt about the positive impact it has made on his quality of life.

Earlier in the Spring he completed the annual ng5k fun run for the second time. At 85 years young he was the oldest person to take part. He has also completed the Great Scottish Walk, climbed the equivalent of Ben Lomond and abseiled 177ft down Glasgow University's Bell Tower.

Bill said: "I want to keep going because the satisfaction I get from knowing that I am fit enough to lead a normal life despite having a heart attack a few years ago is something I don't want to lose.

"I have been fortunate to have the support of Cardiac Physio – Lori Boyce, whose energy, encouragement and enthusiasm has been beneficial to myself and others"

"I hope that I can get the message to people that you can lead an active life even after a heart attack."

Bill has always been active in his local community. He is the secretary of North Glasgow Housing Association as well as being on a range of other groups including the local crime prevention panel.

Despite his many local commitments Bill is

also volunteering with the British Heart Foundation (BHF) Scotland, where he is currently highlighting the Hand on Heart campaign.

Bill said: "I felt that after everything that had been done to help me, I should give something back. I'm now a qualified instructor in emergency life support skills, after going through training with Heartstart UK, the BHF Scotland programme."

BHF Scotland Fundraising Volunteer Manager Carole Nicol, pictured right with Bill, said: "Bill is a natural networker so we've recognised that talent and asked him to work as a kind of ambassador for BHF Scotland.

"He's out there talking to people about our fundraising in Glasgow and helping bring in new volunteers. He's a great asset.

"BHF Scotland would not be able to save lives through pioneering heart research, or provide care for patients through our network of nurses and Heart HelpLine, without the vital funds raised by our dedicated volunteers.

Graduation awards celebrate training projects

CELEBRATION events have been held to mark the achievements of participants in two important training initiatives.

The projects are both aimed at helping people who have experienced homelessness.

Keys to Learn is a partnership between North Glasgow Housing Association, Anniesland College, the Glasgow Homelessness Network (GHN) and the local economic development company Glasgow North Regeneration Agency.

It has Big Lottery funding and participants on the second phase recently completed the 16-week programme and received 'graduation' certificates at a celebration with their families at Petershill Park Leisure Centre.

The course is a mix of academic, vocational and

social skills and the ultimate aim is to help participants sustain their tenancy and hopefully secure further training or employment.

Representatives of the four partner groups attended the celebration and Bob Maguire from Anniesland College presented the certificates.

Robert Tamburrini, Chief Executive of North Glasgow Housing Association, told the graduates: "This is a big achievement for everyone who completed the course. It is a day for celebration and it's great to see the support of family units."

James Mitchell was among those who completed the course and received a certificate. He is a very talented artist and an exhibition of his work was displayed at the event.

The second initiative, the

Bob Allan Project, is run in partnership with GHN and is aimed at providing mentoring for people who have experienced homelessness.

Nine trainees, who had all experienced homelessness, gained a Peer Mentoring Award, accredited by the Scottish Qualifications Authority.

Their course covered the roles of a mentor, confidentiality, boundaries within a mentoring relationship, active listening and communication skills, sourcing appropriate signposting opportunities, goal planning and homelessness issues.

The project was established as a tribute to Bob Allan, the first Chief Executive of the Glasgow Housing Association (GHA).

A group of his former

colleagues worked in cooperation with the Keys to Learn project and secured additional funding from GHA.

The first graduates of the programme had their achievements recognised at a celebration event held in GHA's offices and received their certificates from Chief Executive Taroub Zahran.

Mr Allan's wife Chrissie, who also attended, said: "Bob's passion was helping those whose opportunities are often limited. He would have been delighted to see the success of the project thus far."

Sandra Forsythe, GHA's
Tenant Chair, said: "It's great
to see the first trainees of the
Peer Mentoring project
graduate. We're really proud to
support this project in memory
of Bob and his dedication to
improving the quality of life
and opportunities for
vulnerable people in Glasgow."

Chrissie and Sandra cut a special cake featuring images of the nine new Mentors.

Laura Rolinson, from GHN, said: "The new Mentors already had a diverse range of skills, knowledge and life experiences. By earning this qualification, they are now in a unique and very practical position to inspire and motivate others finding their own route out of homelessness. We would like to thank GHA and Bob Allan's Pals for their continuing support for this innovative project."

New mentor Margaret McMillan said: "We all worked very hard over the 20 weeks of the course and have gained valuable knowledge which hopefully we can use to help others."



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Students focus on successes

A GROUP of students on a British Council training programme chose to visit North Glasgow Housing Association as part of their fourth and final module.

Drawn from across Scotland, the group were all active people seeking to make a positive change in their communities.

They were taking part in the British Council managed learning programme InterAction for community development.

The basis of the programme is that everyone can be a leader as everyone has the opportunity to influence someone.

The learning is based on asking about and focusing on problems, learning from successes, how to make changes in the systems we operate and ubuntu – an African philosophy of the interconnectedness of all people.

The British Council connects people worldwide with learning opportunities and creative ideas from the UK and builds lasting relationships between the UK and other countries. It has offices in over 100 counties, including Scotland.

She said: "I was really impressed to meet the adults on your course who had taken a decision to change their lives and take part in your Keys to Learn Programme. The presentation we were

shown by Catherine McKay about her son's school and why she had chosen to attend the course was really honest and consequently really inspiring to me.

"The basis of the visit to North Glasgow Housing Association and talking to the students was to learn from them and leave them thinking about their successes. I hope that we had a good impact on them too."

Why don't YOU get involved?

- write and print a letter to a sponsor with a request for funding using a word processor. Funding could be for the cost of venue hire, t-shirt printing or even food for your event.
- use the Internet to find out and print all the information you need

to know relating to your type of event

■ take photographs using digital cameras to promote your event

You will use Microsoft Office software, MP3 Players, Digital cameras, Photoshop software, the Internet and E-mail so there are quite a lot of skills for you to pick up.

Opening of £7.7m landmark housing project

NORTH Glasgow Housing Association's 900th new build home has been officially opened by Maryhill MSP Patricia Ferguson.

The Association reached the landmark as part of its recently completed Mireton Street development in Possilpark. A total of 65 homes were built as part of the £7.7million project.

The development includes a mix of 3 and 4 apartment terraced houses, 4 apartment semi-detached properties, 3 apartment wheelchair accessible bungalows and 5 apartment family homes. All homes have private back gardens and associated car parking spaces.

After cutting a ribbon to officially open the new homes, Maryhill MSP Patricia Ferguson, praised the Association for its continued commitment to regenerating communities across the north of the city.

She said: "It is a real privilege to officially open this new development by North Glasgow Housing Association, which is playing such an important role in the regeneration of Possilpark.

"These houses not only provide excellent family homes but also include some of the best wheelchair-accessible accommodation I have ever seen.

"Possilpark benefits from having a strong local housing association taking the lead in redeveloping the community. "I look forward to continuing to work with and support North Glasgow Housing Association in the future and wish the tenants of this development all the best in their new homes."

It is certainly making a big difference to the area."

IN 2001 more than 750 tenants living in the Carron and Balornock areas voted to transfer control of their homes to North Glasgow Housing Association from Scottish Homes.

Over 84 per cent of tenants in the area backed the proposals in a ballot paving the way for a £28million investment programme for their

homes and guarantees on future rent increases.

The same year the Association opened a new state-of-the-art office in Springburn. For transferring tenants Ned Donaldson House was their first housing office in their own community.

At the time of the transfer the Social Justice Minister, Jackie Baillie, praised the tenants for embracing "community ownership" saying that she hoped others across Scotland would do the same.

She said: "Springburn tenants have voted for change in how their homes are run. They have voiced their confidence in housing associations and community ownership.

"This means that the community will now be

able to maximise investment by levering in significant private funding which would not otherwise have been available."

Since the transfer the Association has delivered for the tenants in Carron and Balornock. Homes have been improved through new central heating systems and double glazed windows.

Rents have been kept

affordable by limiting any increases to a maximum of inflation only and tenants now have access to a housing office on their own doorstep in the heart of Springburn.

Now almost eight years on we look at just how the housing stock transfer is benefiting the local community.

Tenants delighted with improvements to their homes...

TENANTS in the Carron area are delighted with the improvements made to their homes as a direct result of the housing stock transfer back in 2001.

The Association has promised to spend over £28miilion improving homes through the installation of double glazed windows, new kitchen and bathrooms, and modern central heating systems.

That work is well underway with many tenants now reaping the benefits of the stock transfer programme. Isabel Robertson from Carbisdale Street is one of the area's many happy residents.

She said: "I still had the original stone pantry when the new kitchens were installed a few years ago, and now have loads of

cupboard space.

"The new double glazing which was installed last year is a personal favourite and instantly noticed when I have visitors. It's easily wiped clean and there is no painting required for window frames.

"I've just had my new bathroom suite, heating and boiler installed making another improvement to the appearance of the flats.

"Throughout all the work the workmen were pleasant and very helpful, and there was no damage to the surrounding areas."

Association committee member Isabel Cross said: "The Association has made a number of key promises to tenants at the time of the transfer and it is continuing to meet these promises and more."

Delivering on transfer promise to our tenants

MORE than 400 tenants in the Carron area have recently had new double glazed windows installed in their homes.

The Association invested over £1.5million fitting the new windows in a total of 416 homes in the Carron area of Springburn. Multistorey flats and tenements have been improved through the project.

The work forms part of North Glasgow Housing Association's Planned Maintenance Programme, which was approved as a result of the housing stock transfer.

As well as the installation of double glazed windows, veranda areas in three eightstorey tower blocks in Carron Crescent have also been enclosed to help increase the energy efficiency of homes.

Completion of the project will help ensure that the homes meet the Scottish Housing Quality Standard (SHQS) – rigorous Scottish Government quality targets for houses in the social rented sector.

Chief Executive of North Glasgow Housing Association, Robert Tamburrini, said: "Once again the Association has delivered on its promises to tenants by installing these new windows in over 400 homes. "Completion of the works will make a very real difference to tenants by ensuring they have warm, dry and safe homes. By making the homes more energy efficient it will also make them more cost effective to heat.

"We are delighted to have worked in partnership with CMS Enviro Systems to deliver this project. Feedback from tenants on the quality of the work has been excellent to say the least."

The new windows were installed by CMS Enviro Systems, one of the leading window manufacturers in Central Scotland.

Dave MacGregor, Director of CMS Enviro Systems, said: "We are pleased the project went so smoothly as high rise refurbishments can, for various reasons, present their own unique challenges.

"The positive feedback received from this project is a testament to North Glasgow Housing Association, their tenants and CMS.

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Japanese housing official learns about regeneration

Tsutomu lizuka from the Japan Urban Renaissance Agency spent a day in North Glasgow where he was given an insight into the Association's approach to building homes and improving communities.

Mr lizuka heads up the Japan Urban Renaissance Agency, which manages around 200,000 homes across Japan.

And he was greatly impressed with how Glasgow City Council and local housing organisations have worked in partnership with local people to successfully improve homes and communities.

Mr lizuka said: "I am delighted to have this opportunity to be able to visit Glasgow and learn from your advanced experience about housing estates regeneration. In Japan we are currently trying to refurbish housing estates. When we are doing this we are trying to not only look at buildings but also vitality of life.

"The most important factor in

regeneration projects seems to be resident participation and it is something we want to learn about. I would like to know how to involve residents to achieve refurbishment and new build housing.

"The visit to North Glasgow
Housing Association has given us
an understanding of how
communities can be successfully
regenerated by involving local
people. This is something that we
are very interested in and will use
when I return to Japan."

Depute Lord Provost and Councillor for Springburn, Allan Stewart, was part of the group who welcomed Mr lizuka to North Glasgow.

He said: "It was great to welcome Mr lizuka to North Glasgow to learn more about how we deliver regeneration projects compared with Japan. He was impressed with how we involve local people in the decision making process.

"North Glasgow Housing Association is one of the leading housing providers in the city and it is a testament to their work that we had visitors from Japan here learning about the work they do in local communities." As part of his visit to North Glasgow Housing Association, Mr lizuka, was taken on a tour of the Association's recently completed housing developments in Springburn and Possilpark.

He also visited some of the wider community regeneration projects in operation in the north of the city including Petershill Park – a £6.1million football stadium, leisure complex and business centre

Depute Chief Executive of North Glasgow Housing Association, Bobby Fleming, said: "Working with our partners including the City Council we are committed to bringing about real and lasting change.

"In recent years we have been able to not only improve housing but also create additional opportunities for local people through initiatives such as the new Petershill Park.

"A key success in our efforts has been the involvement of local people and we are delighted to be able to share our experiences in these areas with our visitors from Japan."

Digger apology after defamation court action

ROBERT Tamburrini, the Association's Chief Executive, received a front page apology from 'The Digger' after a defamation action was raised in the Court of Session.

The publication also agreed to pay substantial judicial expenses and make a £1,000 donation to a registered charity of Mr Tamburrini's choice, the Glasgow based Disability Community.

The case was raised after The Digger published a series of untrue allegations made by a tenant, Mr John Quinn.

In a subsequent court action, Mr Tamburrini was exonerated of any wrongdoing with the sheriff finding that Mr Quinn had lied in the witness box. The sheriff also reported Mr Quinn to the procurator fiscal and indicated that consideration should be given to prosecuting him for perjury.

The sheriff said in his written judgement that Mr Quinn "bore a grudge against the NGHA and the defender {Mr Tamburrini} and this grudge resulted from the NGHA's refusal of his job application and thereafter their refusal to rehouse him. As a result of this grudge, he has mounted a campaign to harass and intimidate NGHA staff and the defender."

A spokesman for the Association said: "The board feel strongly the action by Mr Quinn was a blatant abuse of the Court's time and taxpayers' money."

In the recent front page apology The Digger states: "During 2006 and 2007 we published a series of articles relating to the Chief Executive of North Glasgow Housing Association, Mr Robert Tamburrini. The articles contained a number of untrue allegations made by a Mr John Quinn."

The apology added: "The Digger magazine and its publisher, Mr James Cruickshank regrets publishing these serious, yet unfounded, allegations concerning Mr Tamburrini and we unreservedly withdraw them.

"We also unreservedly withdraw statements attributed to Mr Cruickshank in the magazine The Firm, in September 2007, which repeated the allegations against Mr Tamburrini.

"We sincerely apologise to Mr Tamburrini for any distress caused to him, his family or his employers by the publication of these untrue allegations. We have paid the costs of the Court action brought against us and agreed to print this apology to resolve the matter.

"We are also paying, at Mr Tamburrini's request, £1,000 to a charity of his choosing."

Peter Watson, Senior Partner of Levy & McRae Solicitors, who represented Mr Tamburrini, said: "The Digger published wholly untrue allegations about our client over the course of a two-year period and the front page public apology demonstrates the seriousness of its actions.

"The Digger's false articles seriously impacted on the reputation of our client and his employer, the North Glasgow Housing Association, and we are delighted with the outcome that involves The Digger paying Mr Tamburrini's judicial expenses and £1,000 to a charity of his choosing.

"Unfounded articles by publications such as The Digger cannot be allowed to go unchallenged as they damage the reputation of journalism as a whole."

Red Road groups get together in new premises

second hand smoke have an increased risk of heart disease by 23% and lung cancer by 20-30%.
