One Vision: A New North Glasgow - a great place to live, learn, work, visit and invest.

THE way ng homes works with and involves a variety of people in hard to reach community groups

has been recognised by a Good Practice Award at TPAS Scotland's recent Annual Conference.

The Involving All award was presented to North Glasgow based ng homes who have involved a wide range of people and used their views to improve services and communities across the North of the city. In a tough category the runners up were Impact Arts and Viewpoint Housing Association.

CEO of ng homes Robert Tamburrini said: "Working in partnership with others to look at ways of working with and for' our residents we are constantly looking for, and acting on, opportunities to get people and organisations together and this year we have continued to build on our commitment to further develop our relationships with minority groups."

With a multi-cultural mix of residents ng homes takes a proactive and sustained approach to ensure they meet the needs of the groups and also ensure that their voices are heard as part of influencing and delivering on services.

ng homes has made positive connections with African and Chinese communities, recognising the diverse ethnic and cultural make-up of the area and they have carried out a range of Integration events.

With 88 African families living within ng homes properties the association works with groups like African Challenge Scotland (ACS), a community organisation supporting the capacity, development, health, wellbeing and welfare needs of Glasgow's multi-generational and continually evolving African Community.

Housing and regeneration staff support ACS by carrying out focus groups, identifying needs and challenges and working to provide effective solutions. One of the key areas for ACS is to develop opportunities to integrate with other cultures and provide education and employment opportunities for its members.

For the African community the range of activities has included weekly learning in Maths, Science, Physics and languages. There's also a youth discussion group and art and design sessions. Physical activities include football, table tennis, handball, gymnastics and African Dance. A "thank you" event at Saracen House included families and individuals from African, Chinese and Scottish communities. ACS also held a week of events in the

Summer supported by ng homes and attended by 1500 people.

The Chinese community in North Glasgow also benefits from the work that ng homes does with 60 Chinese families currently living within their properties. Events and activities have included the Mid Autumn Festival which included people from a range of cultural backgrounds. The colourful event showcased Chinese and Scottish music, dancers, Chinese food and fun activities for the children. The event was also recognised by a parliamentary motion in the Scottish Parliament.

International community cook-ins were also held with African, Chinese, Scottish and Syrian families attending. Another popular weekly event is the Oriental Gym Exercise which is attended by Scottish and Chinese women who have connected very well and exchange skills and knowledge each week.

Focus groups were also set up with Chinese residents and ng homes staff worked with them to design and deliver on integration activities and weekly workshops.

Particular issues with language barriers have been overcome with the introduction of

Cultural Officers for both the African and Chinese communities and their work includes building relationships and connections within and across cultures working closely with the Scottish community and across generations.

Chairperson of ng homes John Fury said: "We have strong partnerships from community members, schools, voluntary organisations and public agencies and we use all of our resources to create a strong, inclusive, connected community. We are delighted to win this award for Involving All in our community."

The prestigious national awards recognise good practice, involvement, commitment in improving services, building stronger communities and fantastic work from across Scotland.

The National Good Practice Awards 2015 celebrates and rewards organisations, groups and individuals wherever and however they benefit Scottish social housing.




Complaints July-September 2015

world celebrated the Mid-Autumn Festival held in October at Saracen House.

For the second year running the event took place at the Bob Allan Conference Centre in Saracen House, Possilpark.

There are currently more than 60 Chinese families living in ng homes properties in North Glasgow and the event was attended by 140 people, many of them children.

According to traditional Chinese culture, the moon is a carrier of human emotions and the Mid-Autumn Festival is celebrated every year, with people returning home from every corner of the world to meet their family and have dinner with them, admire the full moon and eat mooncakes.

Board Member for ng homes Richard Porter who welcomed everyone to the event said: "What a fantastic family event, it's great to celebrate cultural diversity and we were delighted to welcome guests from China, Scotland, Africa and Jamaica to name but a few."

Regeneration Manager for ng homes Margaret Layden said: "Being far from home the festival is very significant to the Chinese community and its meaning of family union and friendship fits perfectly with ng homes' vision to create a new north Glasgow and make it a great place to live. We believe in bringing people from different backgrounds together to celebrate their cultural diversity.

Entertainment on the day featured performers from the Glasgow Oriental Dancing Association who performed some traditional Chinese Folk Dancing. This was followed by a special American Line Dancing performance by local women from Possilpark and Parkhouse and their new Chinese friends. Accordionist John Carmichael soon had everyone on their feet with traditional Scottish music and community dancing.

Staff from Young People's Futures were also on hand to entertain the children with lots of fun and games.

The event forms part of the Build, Bridge, Bond programme supported by the Scottish Government's, People and Communities Fund.

Car Parks Taking Shape at Balgrayhill

As readers will be aware from our last issue, major improvement works are well underway at the car parks at Balgrayhill multi-storey flats with the bulldozer having now demolished the old concrete structures.

The basement of the car parks were closed in 1987 for safety reasons and changes were promised as part of a package of environmental improvements when ng homes took ownership of the flats in 2011.

The new car parks will all be on one level and apart from being more practical they promise to be more visually pleasing. The new improvements will be featured in a future edition of North News once all the work has been completed. Investment Manager Carmen Baird said: "Work continues to upgrade the car parks at Balgrayhill and we would like to thank tenants and residents for their patience during the demolition and construction period."



Scottish Fire and Rescue Service Working with ng homes



As part of a partnership with Scottish Fire and Rescue Services (SFRS), a SFRS staff member will be working alongside ng homes Housing and Regeneration Departments. Fiona Herriot has been with SFRS for over 32 years with over 11 years experience of working in a community safety engagement role and her experience will be a welcome addition to North Glasgow.

Fiona will be supporting important community safety events and activities linking into SFRS, ng homes and other partner agencies and local communities. Fiona will be crucial in helping to identify and establish early intervention and community safety opportunities and will be out and about in the community to meet with, and hear from, residents. Some of

the programmes that will be developed over the coming weeks will be 'Test it Tuesday' initiative for testing smoke alarms, providing information on home fire safety visits and 'Cooksafe' activities within local community venues.

A key part of the role will be to inform ng homes staff and North Glasgow

residents about potential service improvements and ideally remain focused on working within the organisation to continually intervene and prevent those accidents and incidents, which unfortunately still prevail within our communities.

Assistant Director of Housing Operations at ng homes Lynne Cooper said: "We are delighted to welcome Fiona from the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service and we look forward to working closely with her and our customers on a range of fire safety issues."



Fiona Herriot said:

I am looking forward to meeting with ng homes customers and working with them and introducing them to Scottish Fire and Rescue Service's campaigns and initiatives.

Money advice is Epic

17 million UK adults run out of money before payday. They are not all on lower than average incomes; around 1/3rd of those who earn over £30,000 say they find it tough to live within their means.

Those who find it toughest though, for whom there is increasingly more month than money, have the lowest incomes. Add into the mix the particular challenges Glasgow faces; significantly higher levels of deprivation, child poverty and low incomes, and it's clear why assistance with managing and saving money is so needed.

EPIC 360 is a newly launched, Big Lottery funded, financial capability project working Glasgow-wide to support people to:

- manage their money
- plan ahead
- make informed financial choices
- receive additional support

It's a free, voluntary, and confidential conversation with a financial capability officer in a venue near the home of the person who attends.

"More month than money?" **LOTTERY FUNDED** 1,2,3,4,5, or 6 Confidential chats **Places** sessions, near you, free, informal about your income available and voluntary and spending now! People in Glasgow, supporting people in Glasgow Informed choices, better plans

Conversations can be over 1,2,3,4,5, or 6 sessions of (up to) 60 minutes. These are person-centred, covering the budgeting, borrowing, banking, income and spending of individuals.

EPIC 360 supports people to make changes in their financial behaviours and, in the process, improve lives. Small changes make a big difference. Altering some shopping habits, lowering thermostats, changing

tariffs, thinking differently about the shopping bill, cutting down on certain items, opening a bank account, considering savings options. Unlike debt and money advisors who are often dealing with a particular, immediate crisis, EPIC 360 is trying to make long term changes so the crisis doesn't re-appear later.

The service is free to anyone over the age of 16, living in Glasgow.



What is the Affordable Warmth Dividend?

The Affordable Warmth

or before 31st March 2016 to
keep warm during winter.

Who can apply for the dividend?

To receive the payment you must be 80 years of age or over by 31st March 2016 and living in Glasgow. If you will be 80 years of age before 31st March 2016 you can make the application now.

How long will the scheme be available?

Applications will be accepted from 21st October 2015 until 31st March 2016.

Unfortunately, Glasgow City Council cannot accept applications received after this date.

How can I make an application?

PILOT project designed to help customers of ng homes take control of the energy they use has been launched in North Glasgow.

Working with ScottishPower and City Technical Services, the association's current Gas Contractor, ng homes are one of the first housing associations in the country who will install "Connect" Smart heating controls in 50 of their properties free of charge under the Control and Save project.

A wireless sensor will be installed in each property in a central location and a user friendly hub with a remote control will be situated next to the customer's gas boiler.

The installation process typically takes under an hour and the system consists of a control hub, a wireless sensor and an App for mobile or tablet which can be downloaded from Google Play or the App Store.

Customers will be able to control their heating and hot water remotely from their phone or tablet via the App which allows them to re-set their boiler either for a new timer or to switch their heating on or off immediately. The App also gives customers more flexibility so they only use their heating and hot water when they need it as they can switch it on 30mins before they come home or switch it off if they are staying out.

Although it's not a requirement to be a customer of ScottishPower to use the system, those who are would have access to their account information.

The system will also help ng homes gather information on how their customers consume energy which will enable the housing association to see how well their properties are performing in terms of energy efficiency. It will also help them to identify customers who may require a free home energy assessment check to make sure they are getting the most out of their energy consumption.

Amanda Cunningham, the first ng homes tenant to receive the new Control and Save Hub said: "I'm really pleased that ng homes is doing something to help tenants bring down the cost of heating their homes. With a 5 month old baby I need the heating on all the time right now so if this new hub can save me money on my bills then I'm all for it"

CEO of ng homes Robert Tamburrini said: "We are serious about helping our customers affected by fuel poverty. Although it's at a very early stage, the Control and Save pilot has the potential to help our customers control their heating remotely and let them see how much energy they are using which should result in reduced fuel bills."

Funding for the project comes from ScottishPower through their Warm Home Discount Obligation and Paul Slater, Senior ECO Account Development Executive said: "Control and Save is an innovative project to help social housing residents who are either in or at risk of living in fuel poverty monitor and hopefully reduce their energy consumption. We are delighted to be working with ng homes on this pilot project and we look forward to helping residents in North Glasgow take control of the energy they use in their homes."

Stuart McKindless, Operations Manager for City Technical Services said: "We are delighted to be working on this pilot project with ng homes and ScottishPower to install Connect Control Hubs for North Glasgow residents. We have been working with ng homes for over 10 years providing their gas service and maintenance to all their tenanted properties. We recently installed wall insulation to over 500 properties which again was funded by ScottishPower under ECO. We are passionate about saving energy for our clients and their tenants which extends right through every aspect of our business and to this end we are proud to be part of this exercise with ng homes."

Chairperson for ng homes John Fury said: "At this time of year energy bills tend to be a lot higher so if the Control and Save hubs can help our customers take control of their energy usage and have an impact on their bills then that can only be a good thing"

Ng sports legacy has been supporting a new judo initiative in the community being delivered by Judo Scotland. Springburn's girls only judo programme is thirteen weeks in and showing no sign of slowing down. The 20 week programme, which is developed from an award winning pilot, focuses on physical movement similar to dance, introducing judo gradually to maximize buy in. The sessions also incorporate workshops to encourage a healthy lifestyle, from internet safety to healthy cooking.

As part of the programme, participants receive stamps

for each session they attend, with stamps equalling rewards. The success of the Springburn club has resulted in the most committed members receiving enough stamps to get their Judo Scotland membership and kit.

ng homes has been successful in receiving £443,819 from the Big Lottery for a Pitstops Programme which is a 3 year initiative to support disengaged people into work.

North Glasgow

Pitstops coming to

The initiative is based on evaluation of previous work carried out with ng homes and School Of Hard Knocks Programmes and aims to support a maximum of 300 participants to realise their potential and enhance life skills such as confidence, motivation, team-work, discipline, respect and personal responsibility.

Beneficiaries will be aged from 18 years upwards with a focus on the 25 years plus group; described as disengaged from the labour market, disempowered members of society and facing multiple barriers to employment through issues relating to experience of the criminal justice system, a history of addiction and mental health issues.

Each year the organisation will run up to 4 (16 week) programmes incorporating life skills and two sports, rugby and boxing. This timescale includes recruitment and aftercare.

An example programme will involve rugby and will use fitness coaching/ training, competitive rugby matches, group life skills work, employability sessions, motivational speakers and one to one employability support. The project plan involves overlapping areas where participants require a specific focus and will arrive at certain 'Pitstops' dealing with areas such as skills/learning, housing/homelessness, substance misuse, financial issues, health/mental health, relationships, emotions etc.

The programme will work with specialist organisations including Scotcash, Pollock Credit Union, Kelvin College, Glasgow Caledonian University, Jobs Business Glasgow, Job Centre Plus and Addaction. An end-of-course Jobs Fayre attended by employers who have one real (ready-to go) job will be facilitated. Volunteer mentors will further support the programme.

paying your rent has never been easier

THERE are a variety of convenient and flexible payment methods available to enable you to pay your rent. Although cash payments are no longer taken in our offices, every tenant should have a swipe-card containing a unique identification number, which will enable you to make rent payments at a number of locations using cash, cheques or debit cards.



Rather than carry large amounts of cash around it is safer and easier to set up a Direct Debit to pay your rent direct from your bank account. Direct Debit mandate forms are available from your local office



Tenants can pay rent at any Post Office. To pay using this method you will need your All Pay rent payment card.



You can also pay rent at your bank or building society using bank giro credit slips.



Tenants can pay rent at over 150 shops and convenience stores across Glasgow, including several in Springburn and Possilpark, using the PayPoint scheme.



Rent can be paid online at www.nghomes.net using your All Pay card. If you do not have an All Pay card please contact your local office.

Payments can also be made using debit or credit cards both in person or by telephone to the office at no cost to tenants.



Cheques should be sent directly to ng homes at any of the addresses below to be processed to your account. All cheques should clearly state the rent account number and be made payable to ng homes. Tenants should write their name and address on the back of the cheque, particularly if they are looking for a receipt.

Building Relationships with Thriving Places

g homes as the host organisation for Thriving Places has been working with **North West Glasgow Community Planning** Partnership and partners with a particular focus on building resident to resident relationships in Ruchill and Possilpark. The following information provides an update on some of the work undertaken in recent months. October saw a great turnout for a joint Halloween party in **Ruchill Community Centre with North United** Communities where residents began to share their wishes for the local area, and kids enjoyed a disco.

Thriving Places has also worked with Young People's Futures - encouraging residents to discuss their passions in Possilpark, with a small Acoustic Jamming night in the DEN in Possilpark Community Centre (Tuesdays 6-8 p.m.) as well as supporting a future resident street party in Hamiltonhill.

Further work will focus around a 'neighbours' group, where residents meet for pizza and will chat to other residents to identify their skills, interests and talents in the area, to encourage community-led action.

Thriving Places has asked residents of Possilpark to choose their preferred option for the new

Bandstand and Millennium Space near Saracen Cross. Voting occurred online, and in various public locations across the area and ended on Friday 20th November. Votes are still being counted, and feedback gathered, but initial estimates suggest around 1000 votes from local people.

SPIRIT OF RUCHILL/POSSILPARK **GRANTS ALLOCATED**

Working closely with Thriving Places in Ruchill and Possilpark, is the Spirit of Possilpark/Ruchill funding programme which provides grants for communityled initiatives and constituted groups that aim to make a difference to the lives of people living in the area.

The residents panel have met and so far made 8 awards to constituted organisations through the first round of 'On Your Marks' and 6 grants have been allocated to local residents through the Sparks programme. 

ridges out of Poverty is a Scottish charity helping people in Glasgow move out of poverty and lead change in their communities.

They deliver training to organisations that work with people in poverty to help them understand the definition and impact of poverty, and they also facilitate their Getting Ahead programme with people in poverty, facilitating their understanding of the resources needed to transition out of poverty.

Staff from ng homes have recently received training and taken part in a workshop delivered by the Scottish charity that offers a unique understanding of economic diversity that gives individuals, families, and communities new ways of solving problems.

Bridges out of Poverty's hope is that in the nottoo-distant future poverty will no longer be viewed as economically inevitable. Their vision is to create communities where every person can develop their own future story and be actively engaged in making it a reality.

Executive Director of Bridges out of Poverty Amreeta Kaur said:

"We are extremely passionate about the work that we are doing and are excited when other organisations are open to looking at the issue of poverty through a different lens. We truly believe that bringing people together across class lines creates energy for change. Changes take place at the individual, organisational, and community levels. Once people form relationships of mutual respect, they are much less likely to abandon each other. Organisations that utilise the Bridges model are accountable to their customers. Communities that utilise the Bridges model are committed to building social capital and prosperous, healthy communities for all. To this end it was fantastic working with ng homes on the day"

Head of Organisational Development for ng homes Tony Sweeney said: "It was great for our staff to have the opportunity to learn more about the Bridges model and to hear first-hand stories

from people who have been personally affected by poverty and who are doing something positive about it ably assisted by Bridges out of Poverty - it was both powerful and moving. The workshop gave us the opportunity to come together to explore a really challenging subject and to learn about tools and techniques that we can use to support us to make a positive difference in our community."

Also in attendance at the training day was Chairperson of ng homes John Fury who said: "We often see people affected by poverty in our community and by working with Bridges out of Poverty to train staff and board members we can develop new approaches to tackle the issue."

Housing associations work together on poverty charter

Three Glasgow housing associations are working together to write a new Charter for **Challenging Poverty.**

The idea for the Charter came from Shona Stephen, Chief Executive of Queens Cross Housing Association, in response to survey data revealing the shocking extent of poverty within the association's north Glasgow communities.

Local social landlords, Maryhill Housing Association and ng homes have now agreed to come on board with Queens Cross.

The Charter will list the associations' commitments to challenging and alleviating poverty.

As part of these commitments, Queens Cross has pledged to the Poverty Alliance's 'Stick Your Labels' campaign, which challenges organisations to set out their contribution to tackling poverty in Scotland. The association also took part in Challenge Poverty Week (17 to

23 October), led by the Poverty Alliance.

Shona Stephen, Chief Executive of Queens Cross Housing Association, said:

"We're pleased to be working in partnership with our neighbours Maryhill Housing Association and ng homes on a Charter for Challenging Poverty.

"In light of ongoing cuts to the welfare budget and public sector spending, we know the vital importance of providing services which go beyond bricks and mortar.

"The Charter will represent a joint commitment to making sure we're doing all we can to improve life opportunities in our communities."

Lynn Wassell, Chief Executive of Maryhill Housing Association, said: "Over the last 18 months, the financial inclusion team at Maryhill has helped tenants secure an extra £4 million in welfare and

other benefits. This gives some idea of the







scale of the challenges we're tackling.

"By working together, our associations can maximise our resources and impact across more than 17,000 households in north Glasgow. This Charter can really make a difference "


Away from Track and Field Joseph is one of a team of Commonwealth trainees at ng homes

ocal residents passing through Possilpark recently will have noticed another positive change in the north of the city, with a new 'one-stop shop' service opening up on Saracen Street providing free help to find jobs and get ready for work.

Jobs & Business Glasgow has moved from Balmore Street to a new, much bigger office at 252 Saracen Street, where it's teamed up with Skills Development Scotland to provide joint support for communities living in the north of Glasgow.

The Saracen Street centre has been created as a facility where everyone is welcome to pop in and speak to an adviser in confidence to find out what help is at hand. Based under the same roof, Jobs & Business Glasgow and Skills Development Scotland advisers work together to open the door for people to find the right job or career.

The office provides job advice, access to training or further learning support to help people

develop the right skills and qualifications to find work. For those already in work, there's support from Skills Development Scotland to boost their existing skills.

At Saracen Street there's help for young people aged 16-19 years-old, adults of all ages and anyone who needs extra learning support to get a job.

The team organises training programmes suited to everyone's individual needs, to make sure they have the skills needed to put them on the right path to the job they're looking for. For example, there are courses to help people get into a job in Care, Business Administration courses and basic Health & Safety or Food & Hygiene training that can open up lots of employment opportunities.

Currently, there's courses available through the Saracen Street centre that provide on-the-job training, meaning people can earn a wage while they learn and gain a qualification at the same time. Advisers can also help with finding funding to pay for training.

Getting help at the new Saracen Street centre has led to a full-time job for local resident, William Summers. Having previously completed a construction course organised by Jobs & Business Glasgow, the 16 year-old dropped into the centre to register with a youth adviser, who helped him to update his CV and search and apply for jobs.



During this time, William was placed on a four-week course that leads to employment based on good attendance and time keeping and, as a result, he's now working full-time at McTaggarts. William said: "I can't thank my advisers, Angela and Sheryl, enough for their help. They listened to me to make sure I was offered opportunities that I was interested in and I felt I was never forgotten about. My course was brilliant because I got a work placement, so when I got my new job I already had experience and was able to fit right in."

Another local resident and ng homes tenant, Humphrey visited the centre a few months ago to look for job opportunities after moving to the area from Italy with his family. Keen to find work as soon as possible, Humphrey went to the centre to get advice and support. The team helped him update his CV and gain more training to support his experience in retail and warehousing, achieving a qualification in retail and customer service along the way.

After the Jobs & Business Glasgow adviser registered Humphrey's new CV with a number of recruitment agencies, he was offered a temporary Laundry Assistant job and has recently gained extra hours work each week. Humphrey also benefited from a £50 Job Outcome Bonus form Jobs & Business Glasgow. Humphrey said: "I had a great experience when I went for help at Saracen Street. The advisers have access to a lot of help available and put me into an excellent training course. I was able to find the type of work I was looking for and I keep in touch with my adviser, as I definitely think I'd use the service again if I needed to improve my skills."

Meet the Adviser

A Jobs & Business Glasgow adviser at Saracen Street, Marina Kelly has been helping people get into training and work for over 20 years and is determined to find the right help for everyone who walks in the door. Marina said: "For me, my job is about helping people reach their full potential and make sure they achieve their goals."

As part of her work, Marina provides individual assessments to understand exactly what help and support each of her clients need. Marina explains: "I develop an action plan for each person, to organise the right help based on their individual needs. Some might want to go on a Goals programme, which can help with personal development like self-esteem, and that is particularly good for anyone who has been out of work for a long time and needs to build confidence to get back out

there, into the jobs market. Others may not have English as their first language and I'll organise for them to get help from a tutor who comes into the office."

Having moved across from the previous Jobs & Business Glasgow office, Marina wants everyone to feel welcome when they visit the Saracen Street centre. She said: "We want the centre to be a friendly, local service that people feel comfortable visiting. It's a brand new office with a relaxed environment and it's important for the community to know that we give advice in complete confidence."

Adaptations Help for Home Owners

elp to Adapt is a Scottish Government initiative designed to help older people live independently in their own home for as long as possible.

The initiative encourages homeowners over 60 years old to consider making alterations to their property now to ensure it continues to meet their future needs. The aim is to help people stay safe and maintain their quality of life in their own home.

Helping you stay in control

As a homeowner you may already feel the need to adapt your home, perhaps after a fall or a period in hospital, or because you want to prevent this.

Planning in advance means you stay in control, making decisions based on the full range of options. Home adaptations are often made after an accident takes place.

For some people, however, an accident can mean returning home is not possible. Help to Adapt is just one of several options which may be available to people and it is not designed to replace statutory schemes.

Who is eligible for Help to Adapt?

The Help to Adapt scheme is available to people over 60 who own their own home and need alterations to their home to help them live independently for as long as possible.

Help to Adapt loans, including support to organise all the works, will be available from April 2015 to 2017 subject to demand.

Major Flooding Project Will Benefit Properties In Springburn Area Of Glasgow

cottish Water has started a major environmental improvement project which will tackle sewer flooding in part of the Springburn area of Glasgow.

The £4m investment in improvements to our waste water network will help reduce the risk of flooding in the Avonspark Street area.

A total of 12 properties in Avonspark Street and one in Edgefauld Road have experienced recurring problems with internal and external flooding for a number of years.

The project is part of a £250 million, fiveyear programme of work we announced in February 2013 which will continue to improve river water quality and the natural environment of the River Clyde, enable the Greater Glasgow area to grow and develop, alleviate sewer flooding and deal with the effects of increased rainfall from climate change.

To minimise the risk of flooding in the Avonspark Street and Edgefauld Road area, amey Black & Veatch (aBV), Scottish Water's delivery partners, will install a 2,500 cubic metre capacity storm water storage tank in the sewer network to alleviate the surcharging of

The tank will be 20 metres in diameter and will be 16 metres below ground level.

The project will also include the construction of large diameter manholes and new pipework in Avonspark Street and Edgefauld Road.

Derek Cooke, a wastewater planning team leader with Scottish Water, said: "Scottish Water is fully committed to doing everything we can to help communities and customers by playing our part in tackling flooding and dealing with the impact of heavy rainfall.



"A number of properties in the Avonspark Street and Edgefauld Road area have suffered from recurring flooding over a number of years and we fully appreciate the inconvenience this can cause. We know that affected customers will welcome our improvements to our network in the area."

The work is expected to be completed in about 16 months.

A section of Edgefauld Road between Atlas Industrial Estate and the lane to the rear of the properties on Avonspark Street has been closed from September 28 for the duration of the project.

There will be no access to Edgefauld Road from Avonspark Street.

Mrs Joanna Peebles, Scottish Water's regional communities team manager, said: "Our work will inevitably mean some inconvenience and disruption for local residents and road users but we will make every effort to minimise this.

"We will also keep local residents and roadusers informed of our work and will liaise with them as the work progresses."

Help at hand for residents as **Red Road Flats Demolished**

Denants and residents who were evacuated from their homes when the Red Road flats were demolished recently were able to call on ng homes Housing Operations staff who were on duty from 7am until after 8pm on the big day.

Staff worked closely with Safedem and Glasgow Housing Association offering assistance to all ng homes customers within the exclusion zone and helping with any last-minute preparations before they had to leave their homes

Prior to the demolition ng homes staff had been involved in planning meetings for the big day and Housing Manager for Springburn and Balornock Irene Dalrymple said: "With so many of our customers' homes within the exclusion zone and tenants and residents having to be out of their homes on demolition day we wanted to be there to help in any way we could."

As soon as everyone was out of their homes contractors started to board up windows and doors of those homes closest to the blocks just after eight in the morning. Those inconvenienced could go to a local community centre that provided catering and entertainment or if people chose to make their own arrangements they were given up to £100 per household to assist with expenses.

Residents began moving back into their homes shortly after 6pm, just over an hour later than originally planned. After the demolition Glasgow Housing Association, Safedem and na homes staff were on hand to make sure everyone was back home safely.

The Red Road flats were built between 1964 and 1969 at a cost estimated to be £6million. The planned schedule remains for the site to be cleared by 2017. Future development options for the cleared site are at an early stage and will include further community consultation.





associated with the former railway cutting located between Balmore Road and Ashfield Road continue to this day and in an effort to improve the area a joint working party between Cleansing, Environmental Health, Community Safety Glasgow, the landowner,



Reigart and the local MSP Patricia Ferguson was convened to seek a solution to this problem.

It is believed that the majority of fly tipped material in the former railway cutting is being dumped by local residents who do not realise that there are free civic amenity sites located across the city or that there is a free bulk uplift service which can be utilised for the removal of bulk waste such as furniture, mattresses etc.

Therefore, I would urge you to use the free Council Services that are on offer to help us stop the fly tipping occurring at this location.

I should also add that it is planned to have the west end of the railway cutting cleared of waste at the end of the summer/autumn. The contact number for new service requests to public health is also provided. I would urge anyone who witnesses a fly tipping incident in this area to contact this number and an Officer will be in contact to hopefully take further action.

olice Scotland have issued some key messages for our customers so that you stay safe and don't become a victim of crime this festive season.

Online Safety

- Think before you post photos of your Christmas night out online.
 What may seem funny in private could embarrass or humiliate someone in public. If in doubt, don't click! Remember, what goes online stays online!
- When shopping online, make sure your web browser and internet security is up to date.
 Check the website payment page is secure and look for the padlock in the address line before you enter any card details.
- If you're buying your child a mobile or tablet for Christmas, think about how you can keep them safe online.
- If you'll be away from home over Christmas or even just out and about, be careful about what you say on social networking sites – don't let thieves know your house will be empty.

Shop Safety

Use cash machines in well lit, non-secluded areas and stay alert. Check the machine hasn't been tampered with, hide your PIN, beware of who's behind you and keep your cash out of view.

- When you're out Christmas shopping, you might not realise how much all the presents you're carrying around with you are worth – look after your shopping bags and don't leave them out of your view.
- If you're driving to the shops, park your car in a busy, well-lit area. Don't keep any presents you've bought in the car for longer than you have to and always keep them out of view.
- Ensure your bag is closed and your purse or wallet is not easily accessible when not being used.

Party Safety

- Plan your Christmas night out charge your mobile, remember to take it with you and think about how you'll get home.
- Think about how you'll get home.
 Book a taxi from a reputable company or arrange for a family member or friend to pick you up.
- If drinking alcohol, be sensible about how much you consume.
- Don't leave drinks unattended; be sensible about what you drink and pace yourself. A drunk person is a far easier target for a criminal.

 Keep to busy areas and on public transport, sit where there are lots of other people. If you're using a taxi, make sure it's licensed.
- Drivers should be mindful that partygoers, particularly those under the influence of alcohol can step out / stagger onto the road without warning. Slow down when in crowded areas.

 Thieves know that over Christmas there will be high value presents and maybe more cash in your house than normal. Keep your home secure - lock all windows and doors, don't leave gifts in view of the windows and keep cash in your home to a minimum.

Hello from Anne McLaughlin MP, YOUR Member of Parliament for Glasgow North East

or those of you who may not have heard me say it already, I'd like to take this opportunity to thank you for electing me this May as the MP for Glasgow North East. When I first began my election campaign as the SNP representative in the Westminster elections early this year, there seemed little hope of winning. Every account of polling predictions said that Glasgow North East was the least winnable seat for the SNP. But, I am proud to say that I now represent the wonderful communities of GNE

It's just over six months on and during this initial period I've been settling in to life working in Westminster but most importantly, getting a Glasgow office and securing the right staff members to work in the constituency. My first priority will always be you, the people of Glasgow North East. I work for you and am accountable to you. Unfortunately, I have to be in Westminster a fair chunk of each week so I may not be physically present when you need to speak with me, but I'm only a phone call or e-mail away.

While I'm in London, my team will always be there to assist and advise you on a daily basis. They keep me updated throughout the day and we work together on how best to resolve any issues you may have.

As the GNE constituency is so large and I can only have one office, I've been making a real effort to hold my surgeries right in the heart of all the different communities. If you have a suggestion for somewhere I can hold a surgery get in touch and let me know. I will continue to visit each part of the constituency, so please check with the office team or on Facebook or the soon to be new website for further details.

In addition to this, my constituency team are bringing the office out on the road. I appreciate that sometimes it's hard for people to find their way to a surgery for a variety of reasons so I want to make it as easy as possible. One of the ways to do that is to bring the office to your communities. We have started this in Possilpark where on the second Monday of every month, the team decant to Possilpoint Community Centre from 10am-3pm.

My first priority will always be you, the people of Glasgow North East. I work for you and am accountable to you.

They carry on with their normal workload but are available to give advice to anyone who comes in. I plan to expand this to other areas soon and again, if you have any suggestions about where else we could do this, let me know.

I promised to be accessible to you and I am doing so. During the election I promised that six months after being elected I would hold a big public meeting where I would report what I'd been doing and answer any questions. I did this EXACTLY six months on and thank you to everyone who came along to the Haghill Campus of Kelvin College on 7 November. We will be having more of these meetings so look out for them.

Finally, I was selected to ask a question at Prime Minister's Questions a few weeks back (it operates on a ballot system). In this constituency child poverty lies at 38% so cutting tax credits would have caused that to rise. Well done to those of you who fought those cuts because you were successful and they will not now happen. We have to be mindful of the fact that they will find other ways to implement their cuts but together we can fight those too.

Again, I am so proud to represent you and as I said in my maiden speech in the House of Commons:

There are pretty pockets of Glasgow North East such as Hogganfield Loch, the tenements of Dennistoun, the views of the Campsies from Milton but I would not expect to see much of it in a Visit Scotland brochure.

And sadly today, residents of my constituency are never very far from a derelict building or waste ground, the best and worst example of both beauty and dereliction being the Winter Gardens in Springburn Park. It seems to me that the Scottish Parliament's Community Empowerment Act was

written with Glasgow North East in mind and I look forward to working with the communities as they empower themselves and transform the constituency.'

V Licence Concessions

TV Licensing is working with to ensure you know the different ways to pay for a TV Licence.

You can get a 50% reduction on the TV Licence fee if you're blind or severely sight impaired. Your licence will also cover anyone who lives with you. People who are partially sighted or sight-impaired do not qualify for a 50% blind concession.

You need a TV Licence if you wish to watch or record television programmes as they're being shown on TV. This includes the use of devices such as a TV, computer, mobile phone, games

console, digital box or DVD/VHS recorder.

You don't need a TV Licence if you have a digital box used to produce sounds only and provided that it can't display TV programmes.

A blind concession TV Licence costs £72.75 for colour and £24.50 for a black and white TV Licence. Anyone aged 75 or over is eligible for a free TV Licence for their main address.

Eligible people can register online at www.tvlicensing.co.uk/over75info or telephone 0300 790 6073. The free licence will cover all the equipment in the property, meaning family or carers living in the same home could also benefit.

ng homes Home Energy Check advisor, Imtiaz Ahmed, has been working with Residents to assist them in saving money on their energy bills and providing tips in keeping their homes warm over the winter.

THE PERSON AS

Over the past couple of months Imtiaz has been carrying out home energy checks for older residents with great results. He has been advising them on how to best use their central heating and hot water and providing tips on how to keep their bills down. In some cases, residents have been supplied with energy saving lightbulbs. This has also helped the environment over the last three months showing a carbon saving of 5265kg Co2.

Imtiaz has been helping residents apply for home energy discounts, find a cheaper tariff for their electricity and some have had rebates due to the fact that they have had large overpayments. Recently, one delighted tenant informed ng homes that he received a cheque from Scottish Power for just under £500. Another resident received the £140 Warm Homes Discount and £200 winter fuel discount bringing him an annual discount of £340.

Sheltered Housing Manager, Karen Johnson, said: "Home energy checks are a great way of ensuring our customers aren't missing out on anything they are entitled to when it comes to their energy bills and these savings will come in handy, even more so at this time of the year."

Energy Saving Tips

- Finergy saving bulbs and LED bulbs are supplied to tenants which can save £138 per year.
- Less electrical shower usage can save on your electricity bill. A 10.8kw power rating electrical shower can cost £101 if it is used 10 minutes everyday on average.
- Your washing machine should be used either with quick wash or 30° wash.
- Curtains are helpful for holding the heat inside the room and not letting it escape. Thermal lining curtains play a good role too.
- By setting up the thermostat properly based on your tariff, savings can be achieved. By turning down just 1 °C savings could be £65 a year.
- Choosing the right tariff is important.
- Your boiler should be set in between 50-60°C.
- If possible its better to buy new appliances with an A-rated energy consumption sticker. They may cost a little more, but will be cheaper to operate.
- Tools can be used to see actual energy savings using the Energy Saving Trust website and also others as well.

- If water comes into contact with any electrical fittings turn off the electricity supply at the mains
