He also put forward the business case for a new road crossing over the Forth to be built west of Kincardine and so much more.

"He created a culture that gave staff, often for the first time, the confidence to value their thoughts and ideas. He gave them opportunities to think out of the box and encouraged people at all levels to develop their skills. Bob excelled as a mentor."

Robert Tamburrini, Chief Executive of ng homes, said: "You cannot underestimate the importance of that first building brick, the successful ballot, in the regeneration of not only housing but communities.

"Bob's vision was for more than just bricks and mortar. The transfer of housing from council ownership to housing associations freed up millions of pounds for long term investment in quality homes. The work created and sustained many new jobs and other initiatives were developed – for example, within our own organisation, ng2 was created and has provided many employment opportunities." Bob's wife Chrissie and their family, pictured above, are delighted with the recognition. She said: "It is just great that Bob's hard work has been recognised in this way and for me it is just lovely for it to be located in an area where I worked for so long."

he Bob Allan Conference Centre has been created within Saracen House in tribute to the man who led the transfer of Glasgow's council housing stock.

ng homes decided to honour Bob as he was the inspiration behind Europe's largest housing transfer in 2002, which saw 80,000 Glasgow City Council homes transferred to the not-for-profit Glasgow Housing Association (GHA).

Tenants, residents and the city itself have been reaping great benefits ever since through locally controlled housing associations such as ng homes.

Bob Allan, who died nine years ago, was passionate in his support for people to have not only a decent home and a decent job but to be able to fulfil their aspirations in life.

ng homes is one of the best examples of how housing associations have benefitted from stock

former chair of the Scottish Federation of Housing Associations unveiled a plaque and artwork located just outside the conference rooms.

The Lord Provost said: "Bob's commitment to people and their housing needs is legendary and it's a fitting tribute that is being recognised for his lifelong passion: to enable people to fulfil their ambitions.

"He understood basic necessities like a decent house, an education and an appreciation of the value of lifelong learning, as well as a decent job, as being fundamental."

ng homes staff and board members were joined at the ceremony by Bob's children and grandchildren as well as many former colleagues now working in a wide variety of housing organisations around Glasgow and beyond.

Teresa McNally was the leader of Clackmannan

transfer and is now a leading provider of quality homes in the north of Glasgow. It has previously been involved in marking Bob's contribution to the regeneration of Glasgow through a lifelong learning project and a family fun day.

With the naming of the conference centre there is now a permanent memorial to Bob's legacy and fittingly in Possilpark where his wife Chrissie worked in social work services for many years.

The Lord Provost of Glasgow, Councillor Sadie Docherty, Bob's wife Chrissie and Teresa McNally, a Council where Bob was Chief Executive before taking up the transfer challenge early in the new millennium. She told how Bob led the fight to save Clackmannan from being axed as part of local government reform in the 90s.

She said: "Bob was sound and creative. His strategic vision served us well. Under his stewardship the foundations were laid for the improvements to the County's infrastructure including the creation of a Smart Village and convincing the powers that be to re-open the Alloa railway line.

From April 2015 to June 2015, ng homes resolved 44 complaints, 29 of these were at Stage 1 (frontline) and 15 were at Stage 2 (serious/complex or unresolved at Stage 1).

Red Road Demolition

he countdown to the demolition of the last six Red Road multi-storey flats is drawing near and housing officers are working hard to make sure tenants are kept in the loop.

Around 1,000 homes will be evacuated for what will be one of Scotland's biggest demolition projects and a huge exclusion zone will be created.

Glasgow Housing Association (GHA) own the flats and have hired a local community centre and will provide refreshments and entertainment for people going there.

As an alternative, day trips are being offered and people who want to organise their own 'away day' will be given reasonable expenses if genuinely out of pocket.

The blowdown will be carried out by Safedem, the company used for Red Road multis.

The flats have dominated Glasgow's skyline since they were built in the late 1960s. Although initially very popular with 4,700 tenants finding a new standard of housing there, the tower blocks had a number of problems and latterly were used to house students, the YMCA, refugees and asylum seekers.

A plan to demolish some of them as part of the opening ceremony for last year's Commonwealth Games was quickly abandoned after a public outcry although health given as the reason.

Each of the 1,000 households impacted by the demolition will be contacted directly by housing officers and offered a range of options.

David Fletcher, director of regeneration for GHA, said: "We are well under way with this now and the response from the community has been great. We would like to say a huge thank you to everyone for their understanding and co-operation." He said the scale and nature of the demolition made it "exceptional" and is why the exclusion zone is so large.

The evacuation of properties will start about 8am and residents will not be able to return to their homes until around 3pm, provided there are no unforeseen delays.

Mr Fletcher said: "We'll be putting on local facilities in a community centre with catering and entertainment and offering alternatives such as a day trip.

"For people who would rather make their own arrangements, we will offer them reasonable expenses of up to £100 per household where they find they are genuinely out of pocket on the day. "We hope this will give people more choices, helping us evacuate the area so that we can carry out this complex demolition of six blocks safely."

Maryhill and Springburn MSP Patricia Ferguson is a former Red Road resident.

She supports the single demolition saying: "I think having them come down separately would have caused much more disruption and would have been no good for anyone. So it's good they can all come down in one go."

Tracey Sinclair, Community Liaison Manager for Safedem, said: "Anyone living or working within the exclusion zone must be temporarily moved out for a few hours for health and safety reasons. This affects a significant number of tenants of ng homes.

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Alive & Kicking's 27th Birthday

celebration of all that is good about the people of Red Road marked the 27th birthday of the Alive & Kicking Project.

ALIVE & KICKING PROJECT

Established in 1988 by community activists and supported by local government, the project provides a place for elderly and disabled people from the greater Springburn area to go and take part in a host of activities or even to just have lunch and make friends.

The future home of the centre has become a much talked about issue given that the Red Road Flats that surround it will be demolished in the near future. That was the incentive to hold a 27th birthday event as it may well be the last in their current location.

The event was not short of dignitaries with The Lord Provost of Glasgow Sadie Docherty in attendance along with fellow City

Councillors Allan Stewart and Gerry Leonard. The Scottish Parliament was represented by MSP's Paul Martin and Patricia Ferguson who raised a motion in parliament to recognise the centre's 27th year. Also attending were former MPs for the area Willie Bain and Lord Martin of Springburn, a long-time supporter of the project.

Lord Provost Sadie Docherty said: "I used to work in the North of the city and I am delighted to be a part of the celebrations here today at Alive & Kicking. If there's anything I can do to support the project I will do it."

MSP for Maryhill and Springburn Patricia Ferguson, who used to live in the Red Road flats said: "Congratulations to everyone at Alive & Kicking on its 27th anniversary. It was a wonderful celebration and as always

the members of Alive & Kicking dressed to impress and entertained us all. I look forward to the 28th anniversary."

Lord Martin of Springburn said: "Its been an honour and a privilege to be associated with Alive & Kicking since it was formed 27 years ago and I wish them every success in the future. In fact having just celebrated my 70th birthday I am now eligible to join the project!"

The centre is open Monday-Friday from 9am to 9:30pm. Members enjoy 4 holidays per year to Blackpool and the continent.

As well as daily lunches the centre also provides meals on wheels to those less able along with social, recreational and cultural activities. Other vital services include bereavement counselling.



Joseph Amouzou was delighted when he landed a Commonwealth Apprentice position with ng homes.

A former pupil at Bellahouston Academy's Glasgow School of Sport, he struggled to find work for almost a year.

Born in Togo, Joseph moved to Glasgow aged four and is fluent in English and French and is Scotland's under-20s triple jump event champion.

Joseph's story goes nationwide

His story has been featured on television and in newspaper and on the Scottish Parliament website as part of an equal opportunities probe - Removing Barriers: race, ethnicity and employment inquiry.

Telling the story in a case study featured on the site, Joseph says: "My sports career really came about by chance. My mum took me to a Glasgow Sports Hall event where I was spotted by a talent scout, and that led to Glasgow School of Sport. My proudest moment has to be competing in Trinidad and coming top in my age group for Scotland.

"I don't feel like I encountered any barriers during my school years. There were lots of people at Bellahouston Academy from a range of different ethnic backgrounds and I never felt we were treated differently.

"The problems started when I left school. I was at college, but getting a job was definitely my goal. A white, Scottish friend and I would go out together looking for work. We would hand in our CVs but even though we had the same qualifications, he got the calls. I thought putting my picture on my CV would show I'm smart and presentable. But then I started to wonder if having my picture - and name - on my CV made the difference.

"My mum suggested getting in touch with African Challenge Scotland and it made a huge, positive difference. They helped improve my IT and communication skills. For the first time I was able to meet people from African countries and learn more about African cultures. African Challenge Scotland told me about the Commonwealth Apprenticeship Programme and encouraged me to apply. It was very competitive, but they supported me all the way. There were only six places. I was thrilled to be chosen.

"I love my apprenticeship with ng homes. It's a paid role for two years, and every day is different. I'm always busy and always learning: everything from communications to housing to construction. They're all subjects you never have the chance to learn at school. I'm helping the community and helping people help themselves. It's really satisfying work."

But while colleagues with the same qualifications got interviews for jobs, Joseph didn't and he felt this was because of his cultural background and name.

Margaret McCulloch MSP, Convener of the Equal Opportunities Committee said: "We want to hear about what measures are being taken – and what still needs to happen - to create a level playing field."

NORTH GLASGOW PRIMARY SCHOOL PUPILS BUOYED UP

ore than 100 Primary 6 pupils from three Glasgow primary schools in Milton and Possilpark - Chirnsyde, Saracen and St Monica's – have received special awards from the Lord Provost of Glasgow, Sadie Docherty, at Glasgow City Chambers.

The presentation was the climax of a unique programme called Buoyed Up, organised by Sir Thomas Lipton charitable foundation. Lipton, who was born in the Gorbals, started a chain of grocery shops and became one of Scotland's first global entrepreneurs selling his own branded tea. He was also renowned for his perseverance and



sportsmanship in five unsuccessful challenges to win sailing's premier trophy, the America's Cup, before his death in 1931. He was granted the Freedom of the City of Glasgow in 1923.

As part of the Buoyed Up programme, pupils researched the life of Sir Thomas, learning about sailing, the America's Cup, and what it means to be an entrepreneur.

Pupils also experienced the 'World Of Work' when Chief Executive of V Ships, Matt Dunlop, his senior team and City of Glasgow College staff, lecturers and cadets delivered interactive workshops on maritime life and many different career paths in the shipping industry.

Buoyed Up pupils took part in question and answer sessions too with inspiring speakers. This year's 'Skippers', River City's Gary Lamont, sail design entrepreneur Sabrina Malpede and former St Mirren player and manager, Tony Fitzpatrick, all shared their time and life experience with the pupils.

Former Jamaican Olympic track athlete, Anthony Davis, said of his Buoyed Up encounter: "I was particularly impressed by the level of attentiveness of the class and by the kind of questions the pupils asked. It was a pleasure speaking to them about Jamaica and my own personal experience."

In partnership with the Clyde Cruising Club and the Castle Semple Centre at Lochwinnoch, all of the Buoyed Up P6s learned about the skills and thrills of sailing over 5 days. By the end of the week, beginners had become RYA Level 1 sailors, confident about sailing as a team with other classmates and independently in their own dinghy.

Trustees of the Thomas Lipton Foundation include double Olympic gold-medalwinning Scottish yachtswoman, Shirley Robertson, OBE, who said: "Through Buoyed Up we hope to raise the aspirations of a new generation."

Robert Docherty of ng homes, one of the organisations who supported Buoyed Up, said: "Buoyed up is a fantastic opportunity for young people - I'm sure they will



have benefitted from their sailing experience and we also hope the inspirational talks from Anthony Davis former Jamaican Olympic Sprinter and former footballer and manager Tony Fitzpatrick had an impact on the young people also."

HAPPY LIVING THE HIGH LIFE

ften when we hear about multi-storey flats in Glasgow it's a story about them being demolished or being a blot on the landscape. That's certainly not the case with the multi-storey properties that are managed by ng homes.

We are responsible for 14 multi-storeys in the area and four of those blocks are located at the highest point in the city at Balgrayhill overlooking Springburn Park. With two 26-storey blocks containing 200 flats and two 25-storey blocks containing 192 flats almost 400 families live in the striking tower blocks which were officially opened by the late Prime Minister Harold Wilson in 1968.

In 2011 the ownership of the multi-storeys transferred to ng homes and since then we have invested \pounds 3million in the buildings.

That investment has seen the blocks transformed with the foyers, which were exposed to the elements for over 40 years, now enclosed creating community spaces where residents can meet. The entrance areas have been upgraded as have the landings.

Each flat has also benefitted from both external and internal wall insulation and work is also underway to renew the lifts.

Each flat has a controlled door-entry system and there is also a drying area on each floor and chutes for household waste with Fridays designated as recycling days.

Alec Chambers has lived in the flats at Balgrayhill since 1989 and reckons there's no better place to live. He said: "Its quiet up here which is great. I'm on the very top in my block and the views are fantastic."

Alec also praised the ng homes concierge service saying: "Whenever I have needed them they have been very good."

Neighbours Pat Forsyth and Eleanor Baggley live at 42 Viewpoint Place and they have seen many changes to the buildings over the years. Eleanor was one of the first tenants who moved into the flats with her family when they were built in 1967. She said: "We moved from a tenement with an outside loo so these flats were luxury – a house with a bath was just amazing to us back then. We have had new kitchens, new bathrooms, electrical rewiring and new windows all as a result of the transfer to ng homes. We are in the process of getting new lifts so that will be another major improvement. I absolutely love my flat and I think these blocks in Balgrayhill are the best out of all the multi-storeys in the city."

Pat said: "I've lived here for about 30 years and it's a great place to live. For me, one of the best things about living in the flats is the bus stop is right on your doorstep so you can go anywhere. The views are magnificent too, we can see as far as the

Erskine Bridge and the Campsie Hills. We also feel safe living here with the concierge just a phone call away."

A 24Hr concierge service is provided to over 1,100 customers who live in ng homes' multi-storey and deck access properties. The main aim of the service is to make sure everyone feels safe and secure in their homes and are happy living in the North Glasgow community.

The service operates 24/7 from a newly expanded and refurbished control room equipped with the latest technology in the heart of the multistorey area at Lenzie Place. This is where highly trained staff operate state of the art CCTV cameras and other technology.

ng homes Chairperson John Fury (pictured above with ng homes Concierge staff and tenants) lives in a multi-storey property in the Carron estate and he said: "We are committed to the multi-storey properties in North Glasgow. With our ongoing investment programme in technology to improve our services to tenants, residents and anyone who uses our multi-storey flats we continue to make them a great place to live."

e want to help our tenants to live as safely and independently in their homes for as long as possible. One of the ways of doing this is to carry out adaptations to help if their health or mobility needs have changed since they first moved in. Occupational Therapists (OT) from Social Work carry out assessments where tenants feel they need adaptations such as grab rails, ramps or level access showers. Once ng homes receives a report from the OT it is then assessed and the work is instructed.

All adaptations are inspected by our technical officers when they're finished to ensure the quality of work is of the highest standard.

One of the latest tenants to benefit from adaptations

to her home is Sandra Guascone. Sandra has spinal arthritis which affects her mobility.

To help Sandra ng homes has adapted her bathroom and it is now a fully functioning wet room which gives her easy access to wash and bathe without the need to struggle in and out of her bath/ shower.

Sandra, who has lived in Balornock for over 30 years said: I am absolutely delighted with the work carried out by ng homes on my bathroom. This will make a huge difference to me and make life a bit easier each day."

Terri McChesney, Sandra's Housing Officer said: "We want our tenants to be able to live in their homes independently for as long as possible and by working with Social Work and adapting them to suit their changing needs we can do that "

If your needs have changed through ill health and you wish to add minor adaptations to your home you will need to speak with your Occupational Therapist who will then complete an assessment and request for any minor adaptations to be carried out.

Oriental Gym Exercise

A new gym exercise is being delivered every Wednesday at the Possilpoint Community Centre.

Oriental Gym Exercise is an alternative way to work out but ultimately achieves the same end result of building good health.

It does not require intense exercise but instead emphasises the way to have strength in blood vessels and the nerve system in order to keep blood flowing normally and smoothly in the body.

A good example is 'Taichi Chuan' which is a very popular morning exercise among Chinese people.

However, the complicated steps of Taichi Chuan and long hours of practice discourage beginners and they find it difficult to maintain the exercise consistently.

Oriental Gym Exercise is very popular in Hong Kong. It particularly fits mainly for the elderly but appeals to younger people too. Sessions take place at the Possilpoint Community Centre on Wednesdays between 9am and 10.30am and classes are led by someone well skilled in the exercise and no equipment is required.

Michael Kam, ng homes Cultural Officer (Chinese Community), says: "We can show people how to practice oriental gym exercises that support health and wellbeing."

Past experience has shown the exercise is good for those who suffer chronic disease such as high blood pressure and diabetes. Some improvements can been seen after a short period of time but like all fitness regular and repeated practice pays dividends.

My Internship at ng homes, by Robert Docherty

recently completed a three-month internship with ng homes as part of my Housing Studies postgraduate diploma programme at the University of Stirling. The internship is the final part of my diploma programme and is designed in order to give me first-hand insight and experience of all aspects of housing operations at the organisation. I started my internship at the end of May and have been involved in various departments within the organisation to provide me with an overview of daily tasks undertaken by staff at the housing association.

My induction at the organisation began by meeting staff, having a walk round the office, learning about health and safety procedures and familiarising myself with the organisation's policies. I then began shadowing housing officers on some of their daily tasks such as interviewing tenants, signups, arrears management and housing options. These were enjoyable experiences as I was gaining an insight into the role carried out by housing officers, meeting tenants and understanding some of their issues and getting to know the different areas of North Glasgow. This initial settling in period also involved participating in training sessions and attending staff and tenant meetings. The training sessions involved arrears control process and void management, both of which helped me to understand the policies and procedures involved in these processes. The bi-monthly area committee meeting for Springburn/Balornock was another really useful experience for me as the meeting provided a breakdown of all housing issues and measured performance at the organisation. The meeting was attended by various members of staff and tenants where there was scope for tenants to contribute to the meeting with any queries or questions. The meeting gave me practical experience of the organisation's tenant participation policy as well

as the opportunity to learn about past or upcoming projects being undertaken by the organisation such as the car park upgrading and other facility improvements across the different areas managed by the association.

My first few weeks at the organisation allowed me to gain knowledge of the work that is done by ng homes in relation to areas which some people might not necessarily associate directly with housing services. The work carried out by ng2 is extremely wide ranging and plays an important part in maintaining and improving the local environment which ultimately has a positive impact on the daily lives of tenants and residents. Other community work such as breakfast clubs and cooking classes demonstrate the innovative ways that the housing association is engaging with tenants beyond simple run of the mill housing services. The Chinese New Year celebrations earlier this year in Possilpark at the Saracen House building are a further example of what proved to be an enormous success in using innovative and alternative ways of engaging positively with tenants. As my time at the organisation went on I continued to shadow housing officers in their daily tasks and began working on two reports which form part of my university programme. The reports are based on my personal experiences and are reflective of my time working here at ng homes and a policy report relating to tenant participation. Shadowing housing officers and meeting tenants face to face has been invaluable in helping me to understand a wide range of issues as well as different policies and procedures. I have also had the opportunity to visit Hawthorn Sheltered Housing complex and the ng call centre where I was able to have a look at the work that goes on in these areas of housing services. These experiences have



given me real insight into the work that is done by ng homes beyond the simple 'bricks and mortar' of providing homes for tenants in the North Glasgow area. Having become familiar with the area I took on responsibility for identifying potential nominations for the annual garden competition and this is another example of engaging positively with tenants.

I have continued to shadow housing officers on housing options interviews, arrears visits, signups and estate management visits as the weeks have progressed as well as learning new tasks. In addition to this I have began writing two reports based on my time at ng homes. These are the final pieces of work I have to submit in order to complete the internship programme. At the time of writing I was approaching the final two weeks of my placement and learning about investment, repairs and factoring services here at the organisation. This has broadened my experiences further as I gain more understanding of projects, what projects are on site, how the repairs process operates and shadowing maintenance officers in their work. These final few weeks working alongside investment, factoring and repairs staff means that I have had experience in all departments at the housing association. Ultimately this is the main purpose behind the internship programme that I get a broad overview of all housing operations which has proved to be an interesting and enjoyable experience. I would like to thank staff at ng homes for all of their kind help and advice over these last three months and for facilitating my internship here. I would also like to thank tenants who had no objection to me job shadowing during interviews and visits.

our skilled handyperson to carry out including hanging pictures and clocks and one job she was really delighted with was the installation of a fireplace which she had brought with her from her previous address.

She said: "I didn't want to throw it out so I was delighted when Andy was able to fit it for me. The service is great, no mess, no fuss and all my little jobs were completed within an hour."

The Handyperson service is free but customers will have to pay for and provide their own materials and fittinas/fixtures although the handyperson will carry tools and small items such as screws and nails to assist.

Each appointment lasts 1 hour (this

doesn't mean just one job e.g. in 1 hour a curtain pole can be put up, a light bulb replaced and a cupboard door hinge adjusted).

If a request qualifies for the Handyperson service a morning or afternoon appointment will be booked. If a request doesn't qualify for the Handyperson service, and where appropriate, it will be logged as a repair.

he past few months have been a busy time for the Community Football Partnerships. We have delivered many football related projects to children, young people and adults and have also delivered many other physical activity programmes.

Here is an update on some of the things we have been involved in recently:

SUMMER PROGRAMME

The summer holiday programme proved to be a big hit, with over 300 youngsters taking part in football, dance and multi-sports activities at venues such as Springburn Academy, Ashgill Recreation Centre and the Peugeot Ashfield Stadium. These programmes were supported by Glasgow North Active Schools, Partick Thistle Community Trust and Utd Sports.

DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE

The Sunday Development League at Glasgow Club Petershill has been going from strength to strength with now over 100 youngsters playing in Soccer Sevens games. The emphasis is always on developing the players' technique in a relaxed, fun and positive environment.

The Development League is funded by the Big Lottery and supported by the Scottish Youth Football Association.

MINI KICKERS

There has recently been a pilot Mini Kickers football programme based in Milton Community Nursery School supported by Glasgow Active Schools and the Scottish FA. The programme introduces younger children to fun games and movement and co-ordination activities. On average, over sixty pre-school children participated during the four-week pilot.

Mini Kickers has been a huge success and the intention now is to consolidate and introduce the programme throughout the north of Glasgow.

WALKING FOOTBALL

A four-week programme of Walking Football for adults and senior citizens was provided at the Inner Circle Men's Group in Possilpark. The activity was well received and was supported by ng homes Link Up Officer Gillian Halliday.

Walking Football is designed to help keep adults and senior citizens active in an informal environment. On average ten men participated



each week. Currently, consideration is being given into having a regular programme and also introducing Walking Football into other areas within North Glasgow.

PROMOTING EQUALITY AND DIVERSITY

ng homes has received further funding from the Scottish Government to continue the successful educational and activity programme that promotes Equality and Diversity in North Glasgow. The programme has a particular focus on positively changing attitudes and behaviours in schools and communities around sectarianism.

ng homes partners include; Glasgow City Council Education Services, Celtic and Rangers Learning Centres, Partick Thistle Football Club, the Scottish FA, the Scottish Youth FA, Sense over Sectarianism, Nil by Mouth and Xchange Scotland and many others.

John Fury, ng homes Chairperson, said: "Our

Football Development Partnership Manager Robert Docherty and all at ng homes were delighted to receive additional funding from the Scottish Government. It will enable us to consolidate and expand our programme of activities and workshops and introduce new creative ways to engage our target audiences."

FUTURE ACTIVITIES

The Community Football Partnership programmes kick off again in the autumn and will include; anti-sectarian workshops targeting schools, local clubs and community groups involving football, dance and drama. In addition there will be school curricular-based programmes, afterschool clubs, football festivals and small-sided leagues, club development, Walking Football, a dance programme and Minikickers, as well as a variety of physical activity programme.

UNDER SCRUTINY BY TENANT GROUP

A Tenants Scrutiny Panel has been established in the ng homes area to make sure we deliver the best possible services and to highlight areas where improvements could be made.

Similar panels have been established in other

areas and are made up of tenants whose aim is to have greater transparency in how Housing Associations operate and to help put tenants at the heart of the organisation.

The panel looks in detail at the housing services that ng homes deliver to all tenants and they give an independent view of how they perform and how its processes work. This group remains distinct from existing Focus Groups.

Assistant Director of Housing Operations Lynne Cooper said: "The members highlight what we as a housing association are doing well and also what we need to improve on. The Panel meet regularly and so far they have been focussing on Central Springburn in terms of estate management but all Colin Cassie, from TPAS (Scotland) has been working with the panel. He said: "At last year's tenants' conference we talked about opportunities for tenants to work with ng homes to scrutinise and assess services. The estate walkabout was the first step in doing that. It will lead to the setting of new service standards that tenants can be involved in measuring. But importantly, it focusses on issues that tenants have told us matter most to them."

Vice-Chairperson of ng homes Bill Rossine, a local tenant, is a member of the Panel. Bill said: "Those on the panel have a genuine interest in assisting ng homes to improve its services to customers and it's a great opportunity to have your say on the services that we provide." express views clearly in meetings and be objective and able to challenge constructively whilst respecting others views. Glasgow City Council Housing Benefit Team have recently launched a new service called the Right Benefit Programme to make sure you are getting the benefits that you are entitled to.

To help Housing Benefit work out your entitlement they need you to provide them with details of any changes to your circumstances. This can be:

If you or your partner:

- stop or start getting State Benefits
- start work or change jobs
- have an increase or decrease in wages
- have savings or investments where the value goes up or down
- go into hospital
- any of your children leave school
- you change address
- the number of people living with you changes, for example:
- you have a child
- other people come to live with you
- you foster a child or children
- other people leave your house.

You should report any changes as soon as possible to minimise any overpayment that a delay could result in. Any increase you may be entitled to will also be put in place sooner.
