£1million Big Lottery funding helps improve financial skills

he Big Lottery has come up with £1million to help people throughout Glasgow to get help and support to improve their financial skills.

The major investment comes at a time when many people are under increasing financial pressures as a result of welfare reform.

As lead partner ng homes will manage the three year Glasgow Big Partnership for Welfare Project which will benefit tenants who are experiencing financial exclusion and difficulties.

Ann Marie Devlin, Depute CEO of ng homes said: "This is great news for our customers. Over the past few years we have offered money advice in our offices and with the Big Partnership for Welfare Project we will be able to reach more families on low incomes and help them to improve their financial skills."

Chairperson of ng homes John Fury said: "We are always looking at ways to help our customers especially in these difficult economic times so we welcome the funding from the Big Lottery, it will make a real difference to people's lives in the North of the city and beyond."

Delivered in partnership with Greater Easterhouse Money Advice Project (GEMAP) and other Housing Associations the project aims to reach over 3,000 people throughout the city.

Tony Quinn from GEMAP said:
"We are delighted to be part of this
innovative partnership with ng homes
to tackle exclusion and poverty."

Those who take part in the project will agree a personal financial plan with an advisor which can include opening a bank account, savings planning or even a switch to more affordable energy.

Group workshops will also focus on topics such as welfare reform, budgeting and financial advice, banking and affordable loans. The project aims to increase access for people to key financial products including bank accounts, credit union accounts and affordable loans.

The project has been developed in consultation and involvement with Glasgow City Council. Bailie

Liz Cameron, Executive Member for Jobs and the Economy, said: "First of all, I am absolutely delighted that this application was successful. It means that as a City we are able to support our most vulnerable residents in relation to the devastating impacts

Glasgow and its residents."

Key stakeholders in the project also include GHA and the Glasgow and West of Scotland Forum of Housing Associations.

Big Lottery Fund Scotland Chair, Maureen McGinn, said: "I am delighted



HOW ARE WE DOING?


From October 2014 to March 2015, ng homes received 88 complaints. Of those, 67 were at Stage 1 (frontline) and 21 at Stage 2 (serious/complex or unresolved at Stage 1).


Our Management Board receives information about complaints performance and monitors the actions that ng homes is taking to improve our policies and services to tenants, factored owners and other customers in response to complaints received.

group of tenants are ensuring ng homes delivers the best possible services to its customers and also highlighting where improvements need to be made.

Tenants Scrutiny Panels are made up of tenants whose aim is to have greater transparency in how Housing Associations operate and to help put tenants at the heart of the organisation. The panel look in detail at the housing services that ng homes deliver to all tenants and they give an independent view of how they perform and how its processes work. This group remains distinct from existing Focus Groups.

Assistant Director of Housing Operations Lynne Cooper said: "The members highlight what we as a housing association are doing well and also what we need to improve on. The Panel meet regularly and so far they have been focussing on Central Springburn in terms of estate management but all areas of

North Glasgow will benefit from their work."

Working in partnership with the Tenant Participation Advisory Service (TPAS) (Scotland) the Panel point out what's good and what could be improved upon in North Glasgow.

Colin Cassie, from TPAS (Scotland) who has been working with the panel said: "At last year's tenants' conference we talked about opportunities for tenants to work with ng homes to scrutinise and assess services. The estate walkabout is the first step in doing that. It will lead to the setting of new service standards that tenants can be involved in measuring. But importantly, it focusses on issues that tenants have told us matter most to them."

Vice Chairperson of ng homes Bill Rossine, a local tenant and a member of the Panel said: "Those on the panel have a genuine interest in assisting ng homes to improve its services to customers and it's a great opportunity to have your say on the services that we provide."

To be an effective member of the panel tenants should have the ability to work independently and as part of a team. Members should be able to understand and analyse reports and information, have good verbal, written and IT skills, be able to express views clearly in meetings and be objective and able to challenge constructively whilst respecting others views. Members of the panel will receive appropriate training.

Springburn resident Cathy Paxton said: "In return for your commitment you get the chance to learn new skills and to be part of shaping the future of services provided by ng homes."

ng homes is celebrating over ten years of Customer Service Excellence as a result of its latest review.

INVEST LIVE LEARN

Following the recent Customer Service Excellence (CSE) review ng homes, the 7th largest housing association in Scotland, were advised that they continue to meet the CSE Standard.

In the report the CSE Assessor recognised the way in which ng homes works with partners to create sustainable communities for the benefit of the whole of North Glasgow as an exemplar of good practice.

The CSE Assessor also highlighted that the association engages in extensive support for the communities it serves and that the range of



activities ng homes provides working with partner organisations warrants compliance plus which goes beyond the requirements of the CSE Standard.

Tony Sweeney, Head of Organisational Development, said: "This is great news and recognises the excellent team work and commitment of our staff and shows that we really care about our customers."

The organisation was first assessed for the Standard in 2004 when it was known as Chartermark and it has been regularly measured against the Government's Customer Service

Excellence Standard ever since. This latest successful review sees ng homes achieve over 10 years of continuous improvement in relation to customer service excellence.

John Fury, ng homes Chairperson, congratulated the Association's staff on this achievement stating: "Our customers are central to all that we do and this ongoing recognition of our work in delivering excellent customer service demonstrates how much we and our partners care about making a

real difference to our tenants, residents and the community in general."

The Customer Service Excellence Standard is recognised across the UK and it lies at the heart of an overarching strategy to provide public services for all customers which are efficient, effective, excellent, equitable and empowering and it is totally aligned with the five key drivers of customer satisfaction; delivery, timeliness, information, professionalism and staff attitude.



ARCTIC CONVOY MEDAL FOR BILL

ar veteran Bill Pickering lives in Abbeyfield House, Springburn, just across from the offices of ng homes.

During World War 2 he gave service in the Arctic Convoy

missions transporting crucial supplies to Russia between 1941 and 1945.

Initially, the UK Government refused Russia permission to recognise the heroic actions of these men but in 2013 consent was given for the Ushakov Medal to be awarded.

Many Arctic Convoy veterans were recognised in an award ceremony in Glasgow Council City Chambers last year but Bill missed out because he had moved to Abbeyfield and correspondence was sent to his former home.

That changed when his befriender, Alison Little from Chest, Heart and Stroke Group, started to

Alison said: "When Bill told me he had served in the Arctic Convoy missions I realised that men had already been honoured by Russia for this.

"His name was passed to the Russian authorities and a medal was waiting for him but they couldn't

find him."

Andrew Pritsepov, the Consul General of Russia in Edinburgh, recently came to Abbeyfield to present the 97-year-old with his Ushakov medal.

Mr Pritsepov said: "All veterans of the Arctic Convoys are war heroes in the eyes of Russia.

"I award you this for your exceptional bravery. Wear it with dignity and pride."

Bill's two sons George and William live in Canada and although they couldn't be there a special letter was read out congratulating him on his honour and wishing him well.

Bill joined the Merchant Navy in 1936. Created by the Allied powers, the Arctic Convoys sailed through blinding snow storms and darkness under attack from German U-boats and fighter planes to deliver vital supplies to the Soviet Union in Northern Russia.

On one mission William was washed overboard. He said "God must have been looking after me" as he was put back on his ship by a massive wave.

A custom made wristwatch which has been produced by Russian watchmakers was also



presented to Bill, as well as other Arctic Convoy servants.

Glasgow City Council Deputy Lord Provost Gerry Leonard also attended and described the day as "a long overdue tribute".

Bailie Allan Stewart, who represents the Springburn area, said: "It's a privilege and honour to be here and be able to see Bill get his medal.

"It's just wonderful that we managed to trace him. It says a lot for the people of Glasgow."

A shot of traditional Russian vodka marked Bill's presentation.

He said: "This feels marvellous."

FIVE NEW APPRENTICES RECRUITED

ng homes has supported the council's Commonwealth Apprenticeship Initiative since its introduction and these are the latest apprentices to have started work with the association as part of the programme.

The Commonwealth Apprenticeship Initiative forms part of the council's flagship £50million Glasgow Guarantee, the largest, most comprehensive and best funded range of support for unemployed people offered by any local authority in the UK. It provides meaningful opportunities for school leavers, graduates, care leavers and our armed forces veterans. To date over 5,600 people have secured a job or apprenticeship as part of the Glasgow Guarantee, which the council has committed to funding until 2018.

Councillor Gordon Matheson, Leader of Glasgow City Council, said: "Since its introduction the Commonwealth Apprenticeship Initiative has helped over 3,600 young people in the city secure an apprenticeship. Glasgow Lord Provost Sadie Docherty who launched the Remember Mary Barbour Appeal, said the Red Clydesider had "revolutionised housing and vastly improved social conditions for so many people."

Barbour became one of the city's first women councillors in 1920 — standing for the Independent Labour Party. She fought throughout her life for women's rights and

led campaigns for free school milk and the first family planning clinic in Glasgow.

At a Civic Reception in the City Chambers ng homes Darren Curran, Tiegan Shearer and Joseph Amouzou spoke about Mary Barbour to an audience of 100 people from the Housing sector and beyond.

Joseph said: "I really enjoyed making our presentation at the event and I'd like to thank the Lord Provost, her staff, our team and everyone in the audience for listening – we hope the appeal reaches its target and a fitting memorial can be created for this great lady."

ng homes Changing Lives Programme

he ng homes' Changing Lives Programme was aimed at secondary school pupils in the North of Glasgow.

The target group were girls and boys in the 15-16 age group identified by their schools as pupils who would benefit from a stimulating programme giving them an opportunity to develop their practical and leadership skills in a number of sports.

The Schools involved were Springburn Academy, John Paul Academy, All Saints' Secondary and St Roch's Secondary.

The programme – linked to existing leadership work in the schools - was focused on helping the young people develop their leadership skills.

This included them gaining valuable experience volunteering with the



It is hoped that the young people involved in the programme will in the future act as ambassadors for the City, inspiring more people in the North of Glasgow to become involved in sporting activities and lead healthier lives which will bring to life the legacy aspirations of the recent Commonwealth Games.

The group completed their Scottish FA coach education and have been on a training course with Scottish Fire and Rescue Services. They also attended courses on snow sport, canoeing and go-karting – all contributing to the development of their skills and self-confidence.

There was an element of volunteering in the



community sports clubs which have been set up in the participating secondary schools with the youngsters completing a number of volunteering hours.

The success of the programme has been in no small measure due to support from Glasgow City Council North-East and West Area Partnerships, Education Services and North-East and West Active Schools.

Robert Docherty, who is Football Development and Partnership Manager at ng2, said: "The project has proved to be a huge success with improvements in confidence,

attainment, attitude and behaviour amongst the majority of the participants.

"The project provided many opportunities for the young people to experience new activities including supporting their skills development and enhancing their 'personal statements'."

Chairperson of ng homes John Fury said: "Changing Lives is a great programme for our young people as it provides opportunities for them to improve their skills and fitness and we are very grateful to all our partners for their support and input."

Activate opening doors for volunteers

Over the past two years ng homes has been working in partnership with Glasgow University to deliver the Activate Programme with 77 people successfully completing the course.

changes to right to buy rules

Following the abolition of the right to buy in the Housing (Scotland) Act 2014 the Scottish Government has published guidance for tenants wishing to exercise their right to buy their home before the closing date for applications which is 31 July 2016. The guidance gives general information on whether tenants may have a right to buy and whether or not they may be able to exercise it. It also outlines the importance of seeking financial advice.

ng2 provide services to ng homes customers including close cleaning, jet washing, environmental improvements, painting, joinery and a handy person service. They currently employ 74 people and just under half of those live in the local community.

Backcourts across North Glasgow have been receiving a major clean up thanks to ng2 and their Jet Washing Team.

It's clear from our picture here the difference the team is making in the area not just with the jet washing but also with graffiti removal techniques.

The team have jet washed all slabs, bin rooms, common areas and brick work in Lenzie Terrace in Springburn. The cobbles, stairs, slabs and brick walls at the multi storey flats at Edgefauld Road, Croftbank Street and Balgrayhill Road have also been cleaned.

In Balornock all tarmac, slabs, drains and communal paths were cleaned at the tenement properties in Drumbottie Road. Slabs, bin areas and communal paths in the backcourts at Saint Monance Street have also been freshened up.

In Possilpark, tenement properties in Killearn Street, Saracen Street, Hamiltonhill Road, Closeburn Street and Denmark Street have all had back court slabs, front paths, communal paths and internal boundary walls cleaned.

In Springburn, backcourts and paths have been fully jetwashed and cleaned in Barmulloch Road, Petershill Road, Laverockhall Street and Midton

Next up for the team is the backcourts in Mansel Street in Balornock then its onto Balmore Square in Possilpark and Elmvale Street in Springburn.

ng2 Supervisor David McIntyre said: "The team are receiving a lot of positive feedback from tenants as we make our way across the community. It's important that the local environment looks clean and tidy and that is what the jetwashing programme of work aims to achieve."

Improving the environment

Social Enterprise company ng2 carry out a range of environmental improvements across North Glasgow and the latest beneficiaries of their hard work are St Joseph's Nursing and Care Home in Robroyston.

Matthew Duffy and Phil McKenna have been jet washing all of the monoblocked and paved areas around the home and have used over 2 tons of sand to keep the grounds looking as good as new.

Sister Evelyn, originally from

Dublin, has been at St Joseph's for five years and is delighted with the work of ng2 singling out Phil McKenna for high praise: "Phil is a terrific worker, he works extremely hard and is doing a great job. Our residents will feel the benefit of the work ng2 have done when the warmer weather comes and they can go outside more."

that everyone at St Joseph's is pleased with the quality of our work and it's always pleasing to hear from others that our staff are doing a great job."

Chinese New Year is an important festival celebrated at the turn of the Chinese Calendar in China. It is also known as the Spring Festival, the literal translation of the modern Chinese name.

Chinese New Year celebrations traditionally run from Chinese New Year's Eve, the last day of the last month of the Chinese calendar. This year it fell between 18th February and 5th March.

Michael Kam of ng homes said: "Being far from home New Year is very significant to Chinese people here in Glasgow. It has the meaning of family union and friendship among people. With the event held in their community this means they can enjoy the Chinese New year with their Scottish neighbours."

Chinese food was provided by local restaurant SeeWoo and dancers from the Glasgow Oriental Dancing Association entertained everyone. The event was also attended by Officers from Police Scotland and Fire Fire Scotland.

Local man Bob Moir provided traditional Scottish entertainment playing the concertina and even had everyone on the floor doing traditional Scottish dances.

Sport, health and education research

A major survey of how active the people living in the North of Glasgow are has been undertaken by ng homes.

The Consultation was undertaken from December 2014 to January 2015 using survey monkey and focus groups - we gathered the views

> of over 220 local people from primary school aged children up to the 65+ age group.

KEY FINDINGS

59% of respondents rated their health as very good or good with 24%

suffering a physical or mental health condition and 11.5% registered as disabled. To put this in context, in the Scottish Health Survey of 2015, 75% of those aged 16+ stated their health as good or very good.

In activity levels, 69% of those who said they were "very active" and "more active than most" stated they would like to be even more active.

One clear message is that the people in the North of Glasgow love being active and would like to be involved in even more activities.

Some of the activities requested might prove logistically challenging to deliver given the

infrastructure of the area such as sailing/windsurfing and surfing/ body boarding.

There were, however, many activities that are wanted which could be implemented relatively easily such as cricket, martial arts including tai chi, wrestling, shinty, hockey, squash, bowls, fishing/ angling, canoeing/kayaking, skateboarding, aquafit, golf, yoga/ pilates, tennis and boxing.

With 58%, slightly more females took part in the survey. Under 16's accounted for 32% followed by 17% in the 31-39 age group and 16% in the 21-30 age group.

Springburn accounted for 32% of the survey with Possilpark 21% and 33% coming from 'other' parts of North Glasgow including Barmulloch, Royston, Summerston,

Maryhill, Germiston and Milton.

In general there was a desire to be involved in activities and most people saw the advantages of a healthy and active lifestyle, particularly for children and teenagers.

The survey also looked at the amount of time that people spent watching television or involved in some computer related activity with most agreeing that physical activity was a preferred option.

Most of the people we spoke to had not heard about Government activity guidelines while the over 65's felt the suggested 75 minutes of vigourous activity was a bit ambitious.

Local people faced many barriers to getting involved in an active lifestyle: the weather, not being able to afford it and not having someone to go with were regularly mentioned during the consultation.

Although 76% of respondents said they could swim and 80% said they could ride a bike, many used the comment box to say they lacked confidence and ability, especially with swimming.



NEW LIFE FOR GLASGOW TIGE

llied Vehicles is one of the biggest employers in North Glasgow but co-chairmen Michael and Gerry Facenna are doing much more in the community than just providing jobs.

Locally born and raised, the two brothers established Allied in Possilpark in 1993 and now provide employment for 460 people. Their group is the UK's leading manufacturer and supplier of adapted and special purpose vehicles.

Allied supports a number of local projects, such as the DASH Club which helps children with complex special needs. Now the Facennas are also investing in their community by revitalising Glasgow Tigers Speedway.

Earlier this year the brothers signed a major deal to buy Ashfield stadium, which was owned by Ashfield Athletic FC and shared with the speedway club. The deal secured the future of both the Tigers and the junior football club, who will play rent-free at the stadium, with Allied Vehicles also investing as their main sponsor.

Michael and Gerry have since embarked on a major redevelopment of the stadium, just half a mile from where they both grew up.

The first phase includes new stand roofs, improved terraces, a new entrance building and

shop, new toilets and improved disabled access facilities.

Gerry said: "It would have been a tragedy for Glasgow to lose two such historic sporting

LIFT REPLACEMENT CONTRACT ON SITE AT BALGRAYHILL

An Open day was held recently for tenants and residents at the multi-storey flats in Balgrayhill to provide information on the lift replacement programme for the properties.

Work has now started at 22 and 42
Viewpoint Place and is due to complete towards
the end of the year. The works being carried out
on the multi-storey flats include the installation
of a gearless lift system, the removal of old lift
equipment, the installation of new passenger
lift doors and door frames, complete machine
replacement, a new drive control system and
a new lift car. Lift Maintenance Limited are the
contractors carrying out the work.

Investment Manager for ng homes Carmen Baird said: "The Operatives and Engineers who will be carrying out the lift replacement work will spend around 80% of their time working within the lift motor rooms and the lift shafts and won't always be visible to our customers. Safety signs are placed within the blocks and contact numbers for the lift engineers are displayed within the foyer areas and in the existing working lift. There will always be one lift left operating while the work is being carried out."

As well as the work at Viewpoint Place it is anticipated that the lift replacement programme for the properties at 178 and 198 Balgrayhill Road will start in January 2016 and will be completed later that year. The Multi-Storey Flats at 15 Croftbank Street and 250 Edgefauld Road are also programmed to start on site in July this year and are due to end by May 2016.

The open days were held at the community space at 198 Balgrayhill Road where tenants and residents received information packs and were able to ask the contractor and ng homes staff any questions they had about the work.

Chairperson of ng homes John Fury said:
"By upgrading the lifts in our multi-storey flats
this shows a clear commitment to investing in
our properties and making them a great place
to live."

BACKCOURT IMPROVEMENTS

As part of ng homes ongoing investment programme backcourts across North Glasgow are being upgraded.

In Elmvale/Hawthorn Street area the project will include resurfacing of the back courts, upgrades to bin stores and improved access to the back court areas. The properties benefitting from the improvements are: (Elmvale St) 126, 132, 138, 144, 150, 156, 162, (Hawthorn St) 630, 640, 660, 670, 680, 690, 700 and (Fernbank St) 151, 155.

In the Petershill area the project will include resurfacing of the back courts, upgrades to bin stores and improved access to the back court areas. The drying areas will be moved and enlarged, with improved stair access. All the work will involve restructuring of the retaining wall. The properties benefitting from these improvements are: 131 Auchentoshan Terrace and 11 & 21 Auchinloch Street

In Balornock properties in Cockmuir Street will benefit from resurfacing of the back courts, upgrades to bin stores and improved access to the back court areas. LED lighting upgrades to the external areas will also take place at the following properties: 33 & 39; and 85, 91, 97, 103, 109 Cockmuir St.

Changing Exams & Support For Parents

Springtime means one thing for older secondary pupils....exams, including for the first time, the New Highers and the second year of Nationals 1-5 which have replaced Standard Grades

These new Qualifications have been designed to complement the Curriculum for Excellence, which has been taught in schools since 2010. Pupils in S5 this year have been studying Curriculum for Excellence (CfE) since they were in S1.

CfE takes a fresh approach to what, how and where young people learn. It aims to raise standards, improve knowledge and develop skills. The fresh approach to learning requires new assessment methods and qualifications.

The Scottish Qualifications Authority (SQA) has developed the new qualifications. They have equal status and credibility to those previously available and will support the new curriculum. SQA has been working with parents, teachers, colleges, universities, employers and the Scottish Government to make sure national standards are maintained.

As part of this programme National 3 replaces Standard Grade at Foundation Level, National 4 replaces Standard Grade at General level and National 5 replaces Standard Grade at credit level

National 1 to National 4 don't have formal exams in May but are assessed on an ongoing basis by their teachers using SQA assessments.

The results and judgements from these assessments are checked by the SQA to ensure they meet the national standard.

National 5 level, final exams remain an important part of the system but most subjects have a focus on coursework and on-going assessment throughout the year.

If you live in Possilpark or Parkhouse your Housing Officers are based at Saracen House in Possilpark. Your Housing Opetations staff are split into three dedicated teams covering Springburn & Balornock, Possilpark & Parkhouse and the Multi Storey Flats.

Each area based team consists of a Neighbourhood Manager, Senior Housing Officer and Housing Officers. The teams also have Housing Assistants and Maintenance Assistants. Remember, you can contact your Housing Officer using any of the methods on the back page of North News.

The Handyperson Service continues to be of great service to elderly and disabled tenants and residents across North Glasgow and its latest fan is Mrs Quinn of Morrin Path, Springburn.

Mrs Quinn had several jobs for our skilled handy person to carry out including hanging pictures and clocks and one job she was really delighted with was the installation of a fireplace which she had brought with her from her previous address.

She said: "I didn't want to throw it out so I was delighted when Andy was able to fit it for me. The service is great, no mess, no fuss and all my little jobs were completed within an hour."

The Handyperson service is free but customers will have to pay for and provide their own materials and fittings/fixtures although the

Handy Person will carry tools and small items such as screws and nails to assist.

Each appointment lasts 1 hour (this



doesn't mean just one job e.g. in 1 hour a curtain pole can be put up, a light bulb replaced and a cupboard door hinge adjusted).

If a request qualifies for the Handyperson service a morning or afternoon appointment will be booked. If a request doesn't qualify for the Handyperson service, and where appropriate, it will be logged as a

course that uses the game of rugby to teach participants crucial life lessons and core values is helping unemployed people find work in Scotland's two largest cities.

Over 20 unemployed men and women completed an eight-week employability programme which uses the values of rugby to develop participants' personal skills and improve their job prospects as well as their fitness.

Professional rugby coaches and players provide rugby and fitness coaching and other staff provide dedicated one to one personal and employability support.

The course teaches life skills such as self-discipline, motivation, teamwork, leadership and employment specific skills such as interview techniques and CV writing At the end participants will have the opportunity to sit down with prospective local employers at a careers event.

The course is being run by ng homes, in partnership with School of Hard Knocks, a social inclusion charity featured annually on Sky Sports. It delivers contact sportsbased interventions to 'hard-to-reach' members of society to tackle issues associated with unemployment, crime and poor mental/physical health. The Edinburgh partners are Link Group Ltd and Port of Leith Housing Association.

In North Glasgow ng homes were

the first housing association in the UK to partner with School of Hard Knocks and CEO Robert Tamburrini said: "We have been working with School of Hard Knocks for three years now and we have seen at first hand a number of success stories with participants finding work or going onto further education. I'm really pleased that people in Edinburgh will now have the same opportunity."

The effect the course is having on participants can be summed up by David, a Muirhouse resident, who said: "The course is brilliant - it's a release from the usual for me. Instead of sitting around the house, I am here meeting a different group of people, as well as learning new skills. It's something new, and I am enjoying the coaching, and the staff are really friendly and helpful."

The course is held each Monday and Tuesday from 9.45am to 3.00pm with two hours of rugby training and two hours of life skills and employability work.

Chairperson of ng homes John Fury said: "The saying a healthy body, a healthy mind certainly applies to this course and I'm sure the participants will all feel the benefits of having taken part and go on to make positive changes to their lives."

Encouraging learning and integration

Using the power of sport and cultural activities to promote learning and integration for children, youths, asylum seekers and refugees particularly in North Glasgow, African Challenge Scotland's (ACS) approach is focussed locally on the young people.

The broader aim of the organisation includes increasing and improving health, active lifestyles and cultural integration of the local community and BME communities. The project also promotes learning activities for young BME people, asylum seekers and refugees to have access to use local sport facilities and gain exposure to sport choices such as badminton, basketball, swimming or

Founded in 2013 in preparation for the Glasgow 2014 Commonwealth Games, African Challenge Scotland takes a completely different approach to community cohesion and integration.

Every Saturday from 11.30am to 2pm ACS offers free learning sessions for young people in basic science, language,

arts, creativity and IT, team-work and participation skills, and assists with homework. From 2pm to 4:30pm the young people engage in sport and swimming activities. The programme is funded by youngstart and has received additional support from ng homes.

ng homes supported 4 adults from the group in partnership with the Big Lottery and they now carry out sports coaching each week.

Ronier Deumeni, President, African Challenge Scotland, said: "Sport is a huge attraction generally and we believe that using sport and cultural activities can enhance learning, engagement and promote community integration and cohesion especially for the migrant communities in Scotland, a large proportion of whom live in North Glasgow."

Ahead of the Glasgow Commonwealth Games last year, ACS held the, The African Commonwealth Games Sport Event, which attracted hundreds of participants from and in around

Glasgow and Edinburgh, and 14 mens football teams, women's football teams. Two womens handball teams also took part on the competition day.

Last year, the participating teams included; Cali Thistle, TSK, Glasgow Afghan United, Eritrean Team, Malawi Team, Shawbridges Lions, Manchester, Poala Leeds, African Challenge Scotland womens and mens teams, Zim FC and Afro Scot.

Ronier added: "We have had interest from more teams mainly from groups from the BMEs communities in Scotland and we estimate the turnout for this year's competition to be more than a thousand, especially on the Sports Day competition which is scheduled for Saturday 25 July 2015."

Celebrating North Glasgow's Green Legacy Programme



hree years ago ng homes were awarded funding through the Scottish **Government's Keep Scotland Beautiful, Climate Challenge** Fund, to work with the community to look at raising awareness of Climate Challenge issues.

The project had a focus on Energy Saving, Recycling and Growing spaces.

Our overall aim was to reduce carbon emissions in North Glasgow by 223 tonnes of C02e and we actually exceeded that by saving 308 tonnes C02e.

How did we do it? We worked alongside the community and focus groups to look at ways that we could make changes in this area. We supported local people to become 'Green Champions' and had 'Schools Green Champions'. There were many community events, pop-up cafes, Generation Knit, clean-up campaigns.

Grow Your Own workshops and allotment spaces have been popular with all age groups and this is something that people want to continue. Entire families and the community helped out at environmental clean-ups and enjoyed and supported recycling

workshops, swap shops and table top sales.

Housing and Concierge staff also supported the project and a big success has been the chute recycling at Balgrayhill and Viewpoint multi storey flats.

Over 200 residents have received great support through our Home Energy Check service where they have been given advice on how to make changes – save money and save the environment too with carbon savings. The total C02 savings from this alone was 72.55 tonnes.

A celebration event was held recently at Saracen House to review the programme and congratulate community members who have taken part in the variety of activities and will continue to make positive changes.

Attending the event was ng homes Board member Richard Porter who said: "I was delighted present our Green Champions with their certificates and the message coming across from the community is even the smallest of changes we make as individuals can make a difference – so North Glasgow will continue to be GREEN CHAMPIONS."

RISE Together Programme

ng homes has received further funding from the Scottish Government to continue their successful activity programme that **Promotes Equality and Diversity in** North Glasgow.

The programme has a particular focus on positively changing attitudes and behaviours in schools and communities towards sectarianism.

Our partners include Glasgow City Council Education Services, Celtic and Rangers Learning Centres, Partick Thistle Football Club, the Scottish Football Association, the Scottish Youth Football Association, Sense over Sectarianism, Nil by Mouth and Xchange Scotland and many others.

John Fury, Chairperson of ng homes said: "We are delighted to have received additional funding from the Scottish Government – the funding will enable us to consolidate and expand our programme of activities and workshops including introducing new creative ways to engage our target audiences."

The RISE Together Programme was introduced in August 2014, and is delivered in association with ng homes, Xchange Scotland and the Rangers Study Support Centre.

The project explores the topic of sectarianism and other community issues – such as racism, immigration and equality – through discussion, play and creative activities.

The programme is funded by the Scottish Government and supports and complements the excellent work Sense Over Sectarianism is delivering in schools.

The project brings together P6 classes from the north and south of Glasgow to the Rangers Study Support Centre for three weeks. The sessions provide participants with a better understanding of the issues, and aims to positively change the attitudes and behaviour of those involved.

Eight schools took part in the project with over 200 children

The learning gained from these sessions is captured by poster-making and writing by the young people with the aim of instigating positive change in their communities and in



communities around Glasgow.

Robert Docherty, Football Development Partnership Manager at ng2 said: "This is an excellent example of partnership working. The programme is proving to be a huge success amongst the schools and school children. Important messages are conveyed in a creative and fun way and this approach supports the learning outcomes of the programme."

Dominic Sharkey (Rangers Education) said: "It is important that friendships are formed across denominations throughout the city. 'Rise Together' has been an extremely positive project allowing the young people from the north and south of the city to work together to discuss how they can make a difference with

regards to sectarianism and racism in their city. The project gives pupils the opportunity to voice their own thoughts and opinions in an unbiased climate and it provides a platform where pupils feel safe and confident enough to share their experiences.

Julia Rodriguez Nieto (Xchange Scotland) said: "Bringing together the young people from the North and South of the city is a great way of widening their safe space and empowering them to think about and challenge negativity and unfairness. It provides them with a baseline for the deeper work they'll undertake at school in following years and it allows us to explore difficult issues in a creative and fun approach".

- express fairly the views, diversity of opinions and outlooks of the community to Glasgow City Council and other public/private organisations
- act as a voice for the local area on any matters affecting the community's lives, welfare and environment
- liaise with other community groups within the local area
- take any such action in the interests of the community as appears to be practicable
- promote the wellbeing of the community and to foster community spirit

In order to be elected to the community council all candidates require to be resident in the area, over 16 years of age, be on the electoral roll or supplementary list. They had to be proposed by and seconded by residents who meet the same criteria.

Nomination forms were circulated after this meeting and an Election Meeting was set for 16th March 2015 in Springburn Parish Church.

By this meeting eight nominations had been received and were duly elected. They are:

Livvi Brooks (Chairperson), David Ross (Vice-Chairperson), Gordon Wilson (Secretary), Sylvia Douglas, Donna Henderson, Ross Mould, Susan McKechnie and Heather Patrick.

A meeting was held on 20th April 2015 at Springburn Parish Church which was attended by Patricia Ferguson MSP, Councillor Phil Green, six Members of the Community Council and two observers.

Items discussed during the meeting were:

- Provision of a childrens playpark in the Petershill Road area to replace the playpark lost during the construction of New Petershill Park
- The current status of derelict buildings on Balgrayhill (talisman pub) and Mansel Street (shop)



- Amount of litter in the Springburn Way area
- Possibility of holding a hustings event prior to the election in the Springburn area
- Children hanging around paths in the Hamiltonhill area.
- Progress being made at the Wintergardens in Springburn park
